I would like very much to build up our membership to about 1000 and it can be accomplished only through the combined efforts and cooperation of everyone, so let's get this membership campaign rolling and perhaps we'll see some results.

Also, the "Sponsor a Buddy" campaign will help a great deal and this being the Christmas Season, I think it would be a wonderful gesture to send a buddy a paid up membership card as a token of friendship to show him that you think of him oftener than just during the few short days at reunion time. I'm sure he will appreciate it.

Early in October, my wife and I made a trip to Dayton, Ohio and quite a pleasant trip it was although the end of it was a little on the hectic side. We spent Saturday with Roger Lemaster and his family and Sunday with Leo Boyd and his family.







Dear Sir,

Quite often, so I've been told, complaints and protests find their way to the nearest wastebasket and never get past the clerk or secretary who has the responsibility of opening and screening the mail when the postman delivers it.

I trust that this letter does not fall in the above category as it is the type of protest that could be repeated a few million times if that few million could or would take the time to voice their protest as I am doing on behalf of myself and my organization.

We have been informed by reliable sources that the old Infantry Divisions and their attached units of the past and present are to undergo a face lifting and name and unit change.

If this face lifting and name and unit change is in the interest of progress, far be it from me and my organization to impede those wheels but I voice the sentiment of every member of the 83rd Infantry Division and it's attached units in this protest.

Men who served with this truly great Infantry Division from the time of it's reactivation in Camp Atterbury, to Camp Breckenridge, on through the Hell of the Normandy hedgerows, the Brittany Campaign, The Ardennes Battle of the Bulge, Hurtgen Forest, the Rhineland and other areas too numerous to mention, all of which made it one of the most active and respected Infantry Divisions in the E T O.

Among it's other attributes was the capture of the 20,000 German prisoners at Beaugency, France, the largest mass capture of World War II and the capture of some 82,000 prisoners during it's tour of duty in the E. T. O.

It received Five Battle Stars, more than 13,000 awards, including unit citations and one of it's members was awarded the CONGRESSIONAL MEDAL OF HONOR.

Sometimes statistics are boring but when they are applied to an Infantry Division with the record of which the 83rd can truly boast, one can readily understand and appreciate the concern on the part of those of us who so proudly served with the 329th, 330th and 331st Regiments and the attached artillery and other units that made up the famous 83rd Infantry Division.

This is not a letter from a crank. It is a letter that I was instructed and authorized to write by the men of the 83rd Infantry Division Association, on behalf of all those men who served with the division during the many arduous campaign of World War II, in protest against changes of name and unit designations for the many great infantry divisions and other units that helped bring about the successful climax of World War II and that help to make up the National Defenses of this wonderful country of ours.

Thank you very much for any courtesy and consideration regarding the subject about which this letter is written and when you consider the many millions who so proudly served in the Infantry and it's attached units, then this Thank You is magnified that many million times and certainly something to be given serious thought.

Dear Mr. Lockwood:

Your letter to the Secretary of the Army has been referred to me, and I have ascertained that there are no plans to change the name of the 83rd Infantry Division or in any way to detract from its fine history of which you rightfully are so proud. In addition to the foregoing I am also happy to report that in present membership the 83rd Division is among the tepmost Army Reserve divisions and currently has a combat mission.

You undoubtedly are aware of the pentomic organization for infantry divisions into which our active units are being changed. Under this concept the three regiments give way to five self-sufficient battle groups which are equipped with the most modern weapons, transportation, and communications equipment in order that they may prevail on the atomic battlefield. This reorganization, like the transition of the square to the triangular division with which you are also familiar, is but another manifestation of the Army's progress in keeping its organization abreast of technological advances.

Reorganization to the pentomic structure does not change the name nor history of a division. The units of the division retain their battle honors and, in the event of future hostilities, would continue to earn credits for service. These honors would, as in the past, add to the prestige of the division under which the units fought.

Please be assured that we fully appreciate your Association's desire to preserve your division's place in the United States Army annals and that we are proud of its outstanding accomplishments.
