Representative Elford A. "Al" Cederberg (83rd Div. Hq.) to Address Banquet Guests

This year we are most fortunate to have as our honored speaker a genuine "Thunderbolt", our own Rep. Elford "Al" Cederberg. Rep. Cederberg, Member of Congress from the 10th Congressional District of Michigan, was elected to the 83rd Congress on Nov. 4, 1952. He is a member of the Appropriations Committee of the U.S. House of Representatives and its sub-committees on Civil Functions and Military Construction.

Son of a Swedish immigrant, Mr. Cederberg was born on March 6, 1918 in Bay City, Mich. where he now makes his home. He attended the public schools of Bay City and Bay City Junior College.

He entered the Army in April, 1941 and was commissioned 2nd Lieutenant of Infantry at Ft. Benning in July, 1942. He was assigned to the 83rd Infantry Division with which he served throughout the war. He served as Platoon Leader, Battalion Plans and Operations Officer, Division Headquarters Company Commander and Executive Officer Division Special Troops. He landed with the 83rd Division at Normandy and fought with it across Europe. He won five campaign battle stars and the Bronze Star medal. He was discharged with the rank of Captain in December, 1945 and presently holds the rank of Major in the U.S. Army Reserves.

He married Miss Arlene Munro of Bay City in February, 1942. They have two children, Tommy, 11 and Marylyn, 8.

Following World War II, he became manager of the Nelson Mfg. Co., of Bay City, which produces trailer coach accessories.

Rep. Cederberg first entered politics in 1949 when he ran for Mayor of Bay City, campaigning for greater efficiency and economy in government. After a successful two-year term, the voters of Bay City re-elected him Mayor by a majority twice the size of that in his first election.

WARREN CHAPTER NEWS

At our regular June meeting the following men were nominated and given 100% support by members of the committee and convention members for consideration and election to the high offices of President and Secretary and Treasurer of the 83rd Infantry Division Association.

In past years a candidate has been selected and elected by the convention without the majority of the members present knowing the candidate's background.

Since the Warren Chapter, along with other Chapters, has the privilege of writing a column in the 83rd Thunderbolt, we would like to take this opportunity to acquaint those of you who do not know our candidates, with their records, so that at least you will know that a vote for them is well founded and deserving.

Joe Minotti is our candidate for President of the 83rd Infantry Association. Joe, his wife Christine, and their three children reside on Homewood Ave., here in Warren. He owns and operates his own business, known as the Club 83. Joe has recently put a large sign high on the roof which displays the 83rd insignia.

His war record is impeccable. Joe served his entire enlistment with Hq. 324FA, entering service in October, 1942 as a buck private at Atterbury, going through the ranks of the non-coms until early 1945, when he was highly honored in receiving a battlefield commission as a second Lt., of Field Artillery. Minotti was discharged in October of 1945.

Joe has made every convention since the 83rd Inf. Div. Assoc. was activated and along with a handful of men at the Columbus convention in 1951 was instrumental in preventing a complete collapse of the Association.

He lives, eats and sleeps 83rd. In the fall of 1952, Joe, George Cooley and Lee Titus got together and began to lay the groundwork for the formation of a local chapter. The plans materialized after months of hard work and time spent in contacting all former 83rd men of the area. The Warren Chapter was formed early in 1953 and stands today as the first chartered chapter of the 83rd Infantry Association.

Minotti served as the chapter's first president and his devotion to the 83rd has inspired many local members to take an active interest in the parent organization, as evidenced by our large turnouts each year at the conventions. It was only at our insistence over a long period of time that we were able to persuade Joe to accept the nomination.

George Cooley is our candidate for reelection to the office of Secretary-Treasurer. His wife, Mary, and their two children reside in Warren. Their home at 1459 Beechwood, NE, is the National Hqrs. for the Association. George is a foreman at a local printing firm and in our opinion is the fireball of the whole division. Everyone who has been to a convention knows George by sight, if not by name. Personality plus is his greatest asset. This, plus the tremendous job, which he has done this past year are the reasons the Warren Chapter has nominated George for the office. His persistence in increasing membership has inspired all of us to greater effort in contacting buddies who were not members, in an attempt to interest them in the Organization.

Our nominee has a tremendous amount of correspondence to attend to daily. Even George's closest friends are amazed at the efficiency which he displays. George, who also edits this paper, has published twice as many Thunderbolts as in any previous years. We of the Warren Chapter will put this publication up against any other organization's publication. Gathering the news and keeping the chapter correspondents on the ball is a very difficult job and George has shown by his interest and efficiency that he deserves to be re-elected.

His war record is also impeccable. George served his entire enlistment in the 83rd, entering the Army in Oct. of 1942 as a buck private going through the ranks until he too, was offered a battlefield commission early in 1945. George refused the commission for several personal reasons and was discharged in Oct. of 1945.

George has been to almost every convention, missing only one, due to the birth of his son, George, Jr.

Cooley also helped activate the Warren Chapter and served as the first Vice-President in 1954. His election to the National Secretary-Treasurer's office has forced him to withdraw as an officer of our chapter, but he is an active member and attends regularly.

Your vote at the convention in Philadelphia for these two candidates will be greatly appreciated. They are a credit to the 83rd Infantry Division Association and in order to preserve the Association's high standards and reputation we need men of this calibre to cement the bonds of friendship within the organization and to prevent any chance of dis-organization such as we had a few years ago.
