As the 83rd Infantry Division marched through Europe, so does it sparkle in the pages of USAF Col. Barney Oldfield's new book, "Never a Shot in Anger", which will be published by Duell, Sloan & Pearce in October.

One whole chapter recreates the historic high-point of Lt. Samuel W. Magill's 329th Infantry I & R platoon when it confronted General Major Erich Elster and his 20,000, and the 83rd weaves in and out of the chronicle right up to the Zerbst bridgehead over the Elbe.

"Never a Shot in Anger" is really about the war correspondents and their shenanigans behind the war.

It tells about how contraceptives saved the D-Day pictures for combat photographers, how a pigeon got the first story back from Normandy, how three women war correspondents wanted to go in with the paratroopers, Marlene Dietrich's search for her mother, what was in Dr. Josef Goebbels' studbock when it was found at Munchen-Gladbach, and how Barney forged the names of Gen. George C .Marshall and President Harry S. Truman to vouchers to get \$3,200 worth of liquor left over from the Potsdam Big 3 Conference which he used to establish the Press Club in Berlin.

There were more than 1,800 war correspondents accredited to World War II, and more than a hundred of them were around the 83rd Infantry Division at one time or another. Three were captured trying to get to Magill's platoon.

Since the book has more than a thousand names in it, about 40 of them former members of the 83rd, "Never a Shot in Anger" is something for Thunderbolters to re-live memories with during the coming winter. Since it's loaded with anecdotes of the great and small, it's what you might call a hysterical history.
