I read it very closely. I didn't find the name of anyone I knew as a close, personal friend, but the names of Mike Skovran and Dave Rosenberg have a familiar ring. Similarly, I can't quite place Ned B. Smith, but I do remember well his bosses—Major Schneider and Capt. Morris Shall. As we all gain poundage and lose hair, it is most difficult to recall some of these faces, and time dims the names.

I was not a charter member of the

331st, but I didn't miss it far. I joined Company "H" in November, 1942, a couple weeks after basic training had begun for the Regiment, and was with the Regiment continuously until I transferred to some Armored Division to come home, in about September, 1945. Even then I wasn't finished with Atterbury—I was separated there. So, I am more than a little familiar with Camp Atterbury. I guess, to quote your letter, I must be an "old timer".

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

Dear Sir,

I served with the 93rd Signal Battalion, working mostly with Infantry and Tank units including the 83rd Infantry Division.

I'm interested in locating medics who took care of me on various occasions.

Not wanting my mother to know, I never reported being scratched a few times and medics took care of me without knowing my name or, if they did, I asked them not to report it. As a result I never received the Purple Heart with clusters, extra pay, etc. Am service connected on my back and taking out patient treatment at the VA almost daily.



V Corps Artillery APO 175, New York, N.Y. 6 July 1963

Dear Bill,

I know I won't get to the reunion this year or next because I have extended in Germany for a year which keeps me here until October 1964.

Eunice and I took a trip just after Easter that may be of interest to you. Ann was home from college for ten days so took care of Bill, Carol and Dorothy

while we were gone.

We took of in our Volkswagen and covered those parts of Luxembourg City, Belgium and Western Germany where the Thundering Herd from the 83rd

went through.

Spent two nights in Luxembourg City, which is interesting, being old, yet mod-ern. The old fortifications, built into the particularly fascinating.

Moselle River from the cliffs, were Toured the Moselle River from the French border (where we once had an OP in France, gun positions in Luxembourg and targets in Germany) as far north as Echternach, where we had lunch and walked through the park on a quiet sunny day. Incidentally, we entered Luxembourg from Trier, through Wasserbillig, and I saw Konz Karthaus as we went by. Trier has ruins of Roman civilization dating back to the 4th cen-utry, AD. Went through Mertert, Grevenmacher, Niederanven, Hesperange, Werndorff (believe Divarty was there for awhile), Remich, Moormeldange, Flaxweiler, Berdorf and saw many other familiar names. This is a very neat and prosperous country. Everything is most clean and the roads are in perfect shape.

We left Luxembourg and headed for the Battle of the Bulge area. Up through Bastogne, Houffalize, Courtil, Bovigny, Joubieval, Lierneux, Manhay, Marche and Rochefort where we had lunch. This countryside also looks very peaceful and no sign of rubble, shattered trees or evidence that a war had ever gone through there. Was not able to identify any specific places that we had occupied but felt that some of the roads that I had travelled were ones that I had been over before.

From here we deviated over through Dinant and Namur for a couple of nights and a day in Brussels; quite an attrac-

tive city.

Then we came back along the Meuse River to Huy and Liege, over to Verviers and Eupen and back into Germany at Aachen. South to Kornelimunster, over the Gressenich and a few other lit-


tle towns, all clean, neat and growing rapidly. Was unable to visit the initial 324th FA Bn. positions in the Hurtgen Forest because of a detour. Drove on across the River Roer into Duren, a thriving and expanding city. North to Julich and on across the plains to Neuss. Recalled that battery of German 88's that we used to fire 3000 rounds into Dusseldorf. Went across the Rhine into Dusseldorf, out onto the autoban and north to Wesel. Took another look at the Rhine, then headed east along the route we started in April 1945. Detoured to Munster to spend the night in this city of churches. Shopped in their Saturday morning Farmer's Market then headed south to Hamm. East to Lippstadt, Salzkotten and Paderborn where we stopped for bratwurst (German equivalent of hot dog) then to Bad Lippspringe, Horn, Harzberg, Bad Pyrmont and Hamlen (the town of the Pied Piper on the Weser River) south and east to Klein Rhuden where we climbed back on the autobahn and headed back to Darmstadt.

It was an interesting trip. Found that my memory is quite hazy and things did not come back to me. The rolling plains and gentle foothills of Northern Germany are a natural route for a fast-moving operation such as our RAG TAG CIRCUS.

Last weekend we took Ann and Bill on a four-day weekend trip to Paris and found that things are a lot more crowded and expensive than on that 3-day pass that Lt. Col. Bob Smith and I had there about 18 years ago. Don't know whether I'll be able to get over to Omaha Beach, St. Malo or the Loire Valley. Did get to see "The Longest Day" when it was here and the beaches looked a little familiar.

I believe I told you of renewing friendship with Lt. Col. Quentin Pease who is in the Artillery section of Seventh Army Hqtrs. A more recent arrival in this area is Lt. Col. Edward Burr, II who commands one of the missile battalions here.
