200 Veterans Let Memories Mire in Camp Mudbury

The above is the headline that appeared in the Indianapolis Times on Thursday, August 15th, 1936 to commemorate our return to the camp of our activation just 21 years ago on that date.

The boys were returning "home" for a sentimental journey, to Camp Atterbury, which was one of the highlights of our three days reunion in Indianapolis.

Many stories were told and as John Robinette stated: "We used to call it Mudbury." The camp was brand new when we got there and the ground was a solid sea of mud and some of the boys will recall cleaning mud off the barracks floor with tooth brushes--as extra duty of course. The aging and dilapidated buildings brought back many pleasant and unpleasant memories to all who made the trip. Actually it was like coming home as many of the men met their wives in towns surrounding the camp.

This, of course, was the start of our 17th reunion and, though other aspects of the reunion may be forgotten, eventually, this trip "back home" will forever live in the memories of the more than 200 83rd Division men who made the trip.






