



Nuclear Weapons Testing Is Everybody's Business

Col. Wayne Bart, Dean of Boys and Instructor in Physics and Advanced Mathematics at The Leelanau Schools is helping to clear up the fog of mystery which enshrouds nuclear weapons testing. This is accomplished through speaking engagements at service clubs in the Grand Traverse area. Col. Bart's informal talk is said to be "lucid and accurate."

It should be, since Col. Bart, given to hiding his light under a bushel, is an authority on this crucial subject. As Executive Officer, Office of Deputy Chief of Staff, Weapons Effects and Tests, Armed Forces Special Weapons Project, 1955-1959, he coordinated the activities in planning and supervising laboratory research and full-scale testing of nuclear weapons to determine their efforts on equipment, structure, and personnel He also supervised, co-ordinated, and participated in the preparation of manuals and textbooks on nuclear weapons effects. He was frequently called upon to present briefings to high level Defense Department and other government officials. When former Secretary of State Christian Herter was first appointed to that position, it was Col. Bart who prepared for him the briefing on nuclear weapons testing.

Col. Bart is a graduate of the U. S. Military Academy at West Point, class of 1942. During World War II he served as Rifle Company Commander and Battalions Operations Officer in the 83rd Infantry Division in the E.T.O. For distinguished gallantry and achievement in action during his participation in the Battles of Normandy, Northern France, The Bulge, and Germany, he was award-

ed the Silver Star and Bronze Star. In 1959 Col. Bart was awarded the Legion of Merit for his work with nuclear weapons effects.

Col. Bart has been on the faculty of The Leelanau Schools for two years.
