



"Memorial Day is the day on which our country annually pays tribute to those noble men who gave their lives in the defense of our homeland. Once more our country is engaged in a war to defend nations against unjust aggressors, to assure people that true freedom will continue to reign and to bring lasting peace to a war-torn world.

Already we have come a great distance along the bloody road which will eventually bring us victory over these unjust aggressors and re-establish just laws and Christian conduct between nations. To make our past successes possible thousands of men have given their lives.

Brothers, relatives, friends, strangers —all have made the supreme sacrifice as we march on to ultimate victory, a victory which these valiant dead will neither celebrate nor enjoy. "Greater love hath no man than this—that he lay down his life for a friend".

Will you honor our country's dead? Will you pay tribute to our Division's dead? Will you say a prayer for our Artillery dead? Plan to attend a Memorial Day service in honor of our dead lest it be said: He forgot his friends who gave their life that he might live in happiness and in freedom."

Yes, that was from the pen of my boss who is no longer with us. Although written 20 years ago, it surely contains the message we want to repeat again this Memorial Day, 1965. May their souls

rest in peace.

Oh, yes; even one of our battery members composed a poem for the occasion and our Chaplain read it as his dedicatory poem for the occasion. May I repeat the third and fifth verses for you to

"Today our hearts do voice tribute For those of us forever mute Today, recall departed friend Whose sacrifice has no end Goodbye, Farewell, is not the end For them, the world is now their friend

The blue on high will never hold The debt we owe our warriors bold." I pray that all of you within these words will attend a memorial service of your choosing.

May GOD richly bless you and yours

on this, another Memorial Day.


Once there was an Oriental king who loved flowers. One day he gave a rare lily plant to his gardener and told him to care for it as though it were his very own.

This was sent to me and I'm passing it on to you. I am not sure of what it implies and no guarantees are sent your way but here it is; the rest we leave to you.

ATTENTION:
WORLD WAR II VETERANS
YOU MAY HAVE \$100-\$200 COMING

You may have \$100 to \$200 coming from the government. Many veterans have missed the boat after discharge from the service because they themselves were not informed, or if so, they did not take advantage of what they were en-

titled to under the law.

We call your attention to a dividend that was paid on your G.I. Insurance for each month of service. To the veterans discharged after World War II the V.A. paid a dividend of about 50c per each \$1,000 of insurance carried while in service, for each month of service. The requirements were that each veteran apply in writing for his G.I. Insurance dividend.

You can still do so now by writing to the

VETERANS ADMINISTRATION INSURANCE CENTER

BOX 8079

PHILADELPHIA, PA. 19105

Give your name, address, city and state plus your G.I. Insurance policy number if you know it. If you do not know it, give your service serial number, date of birth and dates of enlistment and

discharge.

The V.A. urges that every World War II veteran apply regardless of whether you think you did apply for this or not. The V.A. will inform you if you already received this dividend. This applies only to those who dropped their G.I. Insurance upon discharge.

Enclosed is a money order for my dues for this year. I am very thankful that I am able to be a member.

After going all the way with the 83rd and not getting a scratch in November of 1962 I was involved in a near fatal hunting accident less than 300 feet from home.

I caught 190 No. 6 shot in a 1½ inch diameter in the small of my back, being shot point blank by my son as he tripped over a fence.

Many memories of my days with the 83rd flashed through my mind as I lay there, my right leg paralyzed from the wound down.

I remembered my old training to keep cool, tell others what to do and try not to go into shock.

After a 3½-hour operation by an exarmy major and a 3-month recuperation I was able to work again and can even run and climb now. So I am truly thankful for just being here now.

Best regards to any and all Hq. 3rd Bn.-331 members and I would appreciate a list of last known addresses of the outfit. I realize the cost of correspondence is tremendous so I've enclosed some stamps. Perhaps I can be of help in bringing some lost lambs into the fold.

I live 41 miles from Camp Breckenridge and as I pass by and go over once in awhile it brings bacy many memories.

Went back to Atterbury about two years ago but was not permitted to go down to the old 331st area. Had to stay on the highway running through camp. After a 340-mile trip that was really disappointing.


I was with the 83rd from the time it started at Atterbury until it was all over and we came home.
