Yet, if Christianity is true and if its truth is the correction for the specific perversions of our time, it is the most solid hope we have in the world, and from the perspective of a distant future it may be seen that Christianity has, in fact, held the world together.



Draft Foes "Bury" Flag in Protest

Ten men — who are members of the Philadelphia Anti-Draft Union—said they buried a 48-star American Flag under a mound of dirt outside the Federal Courthouse at 9th and Market Sts. last night.

The men were among 75 persons who participated during heavy rains last night in a mcck funeral march for the Flag. The march began at the organization's headquarters at 1515 South St., and ended at the Federal Building about 8 p.m.

Lawrence Elle, 22, a coordinator for the Anti-Draft Union, said he led the hour-long march. Elle said the Flag was carried in a white coffin and when the demonstrators got to the Federal Building, they flung the Flag to the sidewalk and buried it under dirt removed from a bucket. Elle said a candle was then stuck in the mound of dirt and lit as about 75 shoppers watched.

Elle, who lives at 1531 Rodman St., said that the Flag was buried "because LBJ made it a symbol of oppression and death in Vietnam and destroyed its real meaning . . . we feel the Flag has been dragged in blood in Vietnam."

Asked whether he considered his group's act a desecration of the Flag, Elle—a former University of Pennsylvania history student-said the law stated "the old Flags should be buried or burned and (that) was an old Flag."

Actually, Federal law — and custom—calls for burning of a Flag that is no longer serviceable. There is no Federal law that defines desecration of the Flag.

A Pennsylvania law lists a number of actions as desecration, including by act that "mutilates, defiles or tramples upon" the Flag, or that "casts contempt eiher by word or ac" against it. Maximum penalty is a \$1,000 fine and a year in prison.

State law does not show how to dispose of a worm-out Flag.

Police did not make any arrests. Ed. Note: This was protested by your Secretary-Treasurer through the American Legion. Arrests were made and fines were levied against participants. We as Veterans should all be ready to combat such things as this.




