Theresa and Babe had just been home a short time and had to get ready for Detroit. They had been on a tour of the western states. Pulling a trailer, too.


I have run out of gab so will close for now.



Memories, memories, the passing time I must confess has dulled my recollections, but as I read "The Bitter Woods" authored by John S. Eisenhower, a thorough story of the Ardennes campaign, I wonder, how the hell did we live through it. There is but two mentions of the 83rd Division in the entire book. One relates the capture of 10,000 Germans by Lt. Sam Magill in the Loire Valley Forey. The other states, "It took the 83rd two days to break into and clear the village of Behain, etc. In this operation the 83rd Division lost more than 1,600 men, a high figure, but not excessive in view of the nature of the resistance, the terrain and the bitter cold." And so I look back and remember the days of the Bulge, and thank the dear Lord for keeping an eye on me. The town of Behain I'll always remember. I was with Capt. Macaluso and a few of the George Company men, including Sgt. Titus, pinned in a small farm house when the Jerries counter attacked with tanks and a company of men. I can still see in my mind's eye the white suited Heinies. I can vividly picture the "typewriters" (the machine guns) on the tanks playing their deadly tune at the farm house. Capt. Mac kept his cool, he tried to dispatch a runner to give word of the counter attack. The poor runner was killed, the minute he ran from the farm house. In the meantime from the farm house we had a field day. The attacking Heinies were picked off as they approached. Still it looked bad in the farm house. But lo and behold three of our anti-tank destroyers loomed into sight and they fired their cannons and knocked out the German tanks and many of the attacking Germans.

All who lived through the Bulge will always remember the cold, the snow, the forced marches, the favorite cry of General Mason, "One more cross road". The sight of the burnt out tiger tanks. The frozen feet, the sleeples nights. The Heinie machine gunners who somehow had clear field of fire at the cross roads throughout the damned woods. The snipers in their white suits perched in the snowy trees. How can I forget Sgt. Shoemaker leading the third platoon of F Co. 331st through the fields on Jan. 6, only to become sitting ducks for the waiting white suited Heinies. In the third platoon, led by Lt. Drucker, we had about 20 replacements who just joined us no more than two days before they were wiped out. I can remember how after night had fallen, Sgt. Shoemaker played dead and escaped and told us of the massacre, the Germans shooting the

wounded and all prisoners. And so in the books that are written all that is mentioned is 1,000 men were lost. I gues we all agree that war is hell.

The following letter is a note I sent my dear wife Ann by V mail more than 24 years ago. I do hope that all will accept this message in the spirit it was written. It was censored by 1st Lt. Mann so it can't be all that bad. So again share my experience and forgive.

Belgium Feb 23, 1945

Dear Wife Ann:

How are you? I hope you are O.K. I have a revelation to make. Yesterday I went on pass to the big evil city. A confession is good for the soul so here goes. For the first time since I left home I did it. Not that I can honestly say I never looked for it, but this time I found the spot and I couldn't resist. I was walking down the street and out of this building I saw some GIs going in and coming out shortly looking pleased and relieved. Then one fellow came out and I asked him how he liked it? He told me it was his first one since the states, and that it was the best he's had and that it was the best thing a man could get. So I confess I didn't need much coaxing and I weakened and I went in. A beautiful girl at the ground floor with a knowing look on her face sort of read my mind and motioned me to follow her. I admit I was nervous and bashful. She led me upstairs. Another madame upstairs took my money. She was like all Belgians all business. She led me to a small cubicle of a room. It was clean and neat. In the corner was a cot. She got everything ready. I took another look and an exultant feeling of joy ran through me. Now that I had decided to do it; everything was turning out better than I had hoped. I took another lok and liked what I saw. Not wanting to waste time, I stripped, and as I stripped I could picture the heavenly bliss I would fall into. Naked I waited no longer. It looked so inviting I literally jumped and fell in. Oh what a sensation. It was heavenly. I just laid and laid. When I grew weak, I just lay quiet, letting the sensation play all over me. It was without doubt the best I've had since I left home. It was just right. I really enjoyed it.

O.K. dear now you can relax; it is only a description of a delightful "tub" bath I had in a public bath house that had cabinet tubs. The pass lasted eight hours and the only thing I enjoyed was the opportunity to take a tub. I had little money, and most of the time I walled about the city. It isn't much different from our own town, large and quite modern. That's about all dear; everything is O.K.

Letter to the Editor Dept.

"The time has come the Walrus said to speak of many things" . . . paying of dues . . . remembering lost and old com-

rades . . . and just plain reminiscing!
It was 3 July 1944; we were to attack on the 4th of July . . . it was to be our first introduction to the war . . . tomorrow was our hour of truth! The place was just outside of Carentan . . . It was here that I first saw Colonel Crabil! A man that must have had many problems and worries appeared to be calm, cool and confident. He saw to it that others felt as he did by word and deed. I remember he didn't look like the C.O. I had pictured, what with his leggings up around his knees... and he was much shorter than 'Big' John Wayne, but he had the 'horsepower' within which makes the difference among men.

That 4th of July will be remembered by quite a few of us even today I'm sure ... it started off with a bang ... a Corps "Serenade" as nearly as I can recall ... enough noise from 500 guns to wake up Churchill, but the Krauts had read our history books too and we didn't get too far that day. It was on this day that I saw a dead soldier from the 329th Regiment ... rifle still in his fist ... his age was about 17 or 18... fist . . . his age was about 17 or 18 . . . blond hair, but what was so strange was he had a U.S. War Bond in his breast pocket (I was looking for ammo if you are wondering what I was doing in his pockets) and I thought: "Here's a kid ... probably enlisted since he was so young; bought War Bonds; fought for What more can mortal man do? Here it's been 25 years since that happened and I remember it like it was yesterday!"

And then I remember in August 1944 ... in Angers one day I bumped into my old basic training Sergeant from Camp Robinson, Ark., 1942... Tech. Sgt. Coco... Co. C, 130th Regt. (a replacement from the depot). He was
