

NEW ORLEANS YOUR HOST CITY FOR 33RD. REUNION

New Orleans is one of the largest cities in the United States with a population of over 600,000, and total metropolitan area population of 1.2 million people. In size it has a total area of 363 square miles, of which, 199.4 miles is land area. New Orleans has a unique and colorful background, it was founded in 1718 as a French Colony by Bienville. It was given to King Charles of Spain secretly by his cousin, Louis XV of France in 1762. In 1803 it was transferred back to France. That same year, New Orleans was sold by France to the United States for \$15,000,000 in the famous Louisiana Purchase, which included the entire Louisiana Territory, now all or part of seventeen states.

New Orleans with its well equipped facilities enables it to maintain its rank as the second U.S. Port in value of foreign commerce, and the third largest in the world. An average of more than one cargo liner docks or leaves the Port of New Orleans every bour of every 24 hour day, with

exports and imports to all parts of the world.

Industrial activity in New Orleans is dominated by ship building, petroleum refining and primary metal production. The City is surrounded by a vast supply of raw materials. Louisiana rates second in production of natural gas, petroleum and sulphur, and first in salt and fur pelts. New Orleans is the Adinmistrative and Financial Center of the rich petroleum and natural gas field of south Louisiana, including off-shore area in the Gulf of Mexico.

The Mississippi River is the source of the City's water supply. The river is the largest supply available in the United States. New Orleans receives its name as the "Crescent City" because it is located at that section of the

Mississippi River that forms a crescent.

The river has a width of 2,200 feet at Canal Street, has a bankside depth of 30 to 60 feet with midstream depth of more than 100 to 180 feet. Levees at New Orleans are the finest in the world and protects the City from the river. The spillway, 33 miles above the City was built by the U.S. Army Engineers. It gave new life to New Orleans and an even greater margin of safety. If the water level in the river becomes dangerously bigh, the spillway may be opened to divert the floodwaters into Lake Ponchartrain and thence into the Gulf of Mexico.





On the road to Angers I rode in the back seat of an open Command car and was taking and returning salutes 'till the Officer in the front seat caught me - I was only saving him the trouble!



10 SEPTEMBER 1944

The 83rd Infantry Division (less 3rd Bn, 330th Inf, and Btry C, 323rd F.A. Bn, executing a mission on the Brittany Peninsula) was detached from the VIII Corps to operate under control of Ninth Army from 1200, 10 September 1944. The Ninth Army confirmed mission of the 83rd Infantry Division to protect the south flank of the Army from Redon to the east. The Third Army in cooperation with the Ninth Army ordered Combat Command "B" of the 6th Armored Division to patrol the area from Meung-Sur-Loire east to Auxierre. The Intelligence and Reconnaissance Platoon of the 329th Infantry established liaison with the 6th Armored Division at Meung.

11 SEPTEMBER 1944

The Division received instructions from the Ninth United States Army to extend patrol activities to Auxierre, relieving Combat Command "B", 6th Armored Division in that zone. Division Field Order No 30 was issued and patrols were organized and observation posts were established to protect the south flank of the Ninth and Third Armies by preventing the enemy from entering area from Redon to Nantes and north of the Loire River from Nantes to Auxierre.

Thirty-one Prisoners of War were captured during patrol activities.

The Commanding General, 83rd Infantry Division, went to Issodun and there met General Elster, Commander of the German forces, who wanted to surrender. In accordance with instructions of the Commanding General of the Ninth Army, terms were presented for the surrender and were accepted by General Elster. Details for the movement of the German force north to the Loire were arranged, and a liaison officer from Division Headquarters was left with General Elster to coordinate the movement of the Germans with the plans for their reception north of the Loire.

Combat Command "B" of the 6th Armored Division had reported that the area from Meung-Sur-Loire to Auxierre was clear of the enemy.

12 SEPTEMBER 1944

The 2nd Battalion, 329th Infantry made reconnaissance to new positions on the left flank of the Division from Tours to Auxierre. Liaison was established with the 2nd French Armored Division on the left flank.

The 330th Infantry relieved the 1st and 3rd Battalions of the 329th Infantry in area of Saumur to Tours. Patrolling continued along the Loire River line. Patrol of "A" Company 331st Infantry had a minor skirmish with enemy patrol, resulting in 5 enemy casualties.

13 SEPTEMBER 1944

Units of the 83rd Infantry. Division patrolled from Redon along the north bank of the Loire River to Bonny-Sur-Loire then east to Auxierre. The 331st Infantry took 102 prisoners during the day.

14 SEPTEMBER 1944

The 83rd Cavalry Reconnaissance Troop, under control of the 329th Infantry, organized motorized patrols on the left flank of the Division area and maintained liaison with the 2nd French Motorized Division.

15 SEPTEMBER 1944

The 83rd Division Command Post was closed at Chateaubriant and opened at Vendom2.

The 329th Infantry completed occupation of the Blois-Auxierre sector and began patrolling operations in that area.

Preparations were made to receive General Elster's

forces at Beaugency.

The 2nd Battalion of the 329th Infantry contacted head-quarters of a French Parachute Battalion in Briare, on a report that 8000 of the enemy desired to surrender. An investigation disclosed these Germans formed one column of General Elster's troops marching north to the Loire River to surrender. Other reports of marching enemy columns involved the town of Jargeau and area east of Orleans. A check revealed these reports to be false.

16 SEPTEMBER 1944

The Commanding General, 83rd Infantry Division, accepted the formal surrender of the Commanding General, German forces south of the Loire, at Beaugency in behalf of the Army of the United States.

General Elster, Commanding General of the conglomerate group of troops from south France, presented his pistol as a

token of surrender to General Macon.

General Elster, realizing the hopelessness of ever breaking through the Allied lines at the Belfort Gap with the troops under his command, having his columns constantly barrassed by FFI attacks and American Air Force bombing, and having lost his confidence in the present German high command, decided to surrender to American forces. Having made this decision, and taking advantage of contact with the Intelligence and Reconnaissance Platoon, 329th Infantry on 9 September he conferred with American Army representatives on details for the surrender. General Elster then marched his troops toward river crossing sites at Orleans and Beaugency, and surrendered.

17 SEPTEMBER 1944

By order of Ninth United States Army official time was changed from "B" time to "A" time at 0300, 17 Sept., 1944.

Plans were made with the Ninth Army for the relief of the 83rd Infantry Division by the 94th Infantry Division. The 83rd Division was alerted to assemble in the vicinity of Montargis in preparation for movement to the east and assignment to the Third United States Army.

The 331st Infantry was relieved by elements of the 94th Infantry Division at 0900 and assembled by use of motors in the vicinity of Montareis.

in the vicinity of montargis.

The 329th and 330th Inf. continued patrolling their area.

General Elster's forces laid down their arms and completed surrender at Orleans and Beaugency, after the formal surrender of the 16th. The enemy columns crossed the river and were confined to prisoner of war enclosures by dark. A total of 754 Officers and 18,851 enlisted men were taken prisoner.

18 SEPTEMBER 1944

The 331st Infantry closed in assembly area vicinity of Montargis, 18 September 1944.

The 329th and 330th continued patrolling the Loire River without incident.


Large quantities of supplies and equipment captured from the Germans were turned over to the Ninth U.S. Army, Training continued and maintenance of equipment was carried on.


19 SEPTEMBRR 1944

Routine patrolling continued in the Division sector. The 94th Infantry Division was on the right flank, the 2nd French Armored Division was on the left flank. Training and care of equipment was stressed. Much progress in training the Infantry-Tank team was being accomplished.

The Division Command Post remained in Vendome.

ONE OF OUR RETIRED

(The following is a condensed version of a story that appeared in a New Orleans News Paper on Sept. 30, 1976.)

Brig. General Karl N. Smith of the Louisiana National Guard will take off his uniform for the last time today after 35 years of Military Service, but, unlike many old soldiers, he has absolutely no intention of just fading away.

Refusing to embrace a fishing pole instead, General Smith is mulling over a number of job offers in the civilian community and will help in making arrangements for next year's National Guard Association Conference to be held in New Orleans.

Taking a break for cleaning out his desk at Jackson Barracks, the trim, 60 year old Officer attempted to put into words his feelings on leaving the Guard he has served since 1947.

"Emotionally, I would say that I am a little bit sad and also happy - sad in the fact that I am leaving some friends who have been real loyal employees," said General Smith who has served as Army National Guard Chief since June of 1970. "These are people with whom I've worked rather than people who have worked under me," he said.

The road to the National Guard career for General Smith began in 1941 when he was commissioned a 2nd Lt. of Infantry after graduating from the Reserve Officers Training Corps program at Louisiana State University.

The young shavetail landed in Normandy on "D" Day plus 7 with the 83rd Infantry Division, fought in the Huertgen Forest and, during the Battle of the Bulge, helped relieve the pressure on Bastogne when his unit severed the St. Vith-Houffalize road.

I've had three sons in the Guard, two of them are still active," says General Smith.

Major General O.J. Daigle, Jr., State Adjutant General, sais, "General Smith's contribution to the National Guard

and his community have been many during his 35 years of Military Service and his capable leadership and organizational ability will be sorely missed.

ARTILLERY NEWS

The Historical Evaluation and Research Organization (HERO) is engaged in a study of World War II and later personnel casualties associated with the loss of artillery pieces. Surprising as it may seem there is no readily available record which shows how many crew members were killed or wounded incident to the loss of an artillery piece in combat. The Department of the Army is concerned with this question and has contracted us (HERO) to prepare statistical data relating to personnel and artillery losses. Accordingly we have prepared a short questionnaire which we believe can be easily answered by individuals having personal recollections of casualtirs and artillery losses in their units.

If you have knowledge of such incidents, it would be greatly appreciated if you would answer the questionnaire enclosed. In addition, could you send me the names of other individuals from as many different units within your organization as possible, who you believe would be able to provide such information from their own personal experience. All participants in this study will be given credit for their assistance.








REP. 'BILL' SHUMAN IS DEAD AT 57

Rep. William O. Shuman, serving his seventh term in the House of Representatives from the 90th Legislative District died Wednesday evening in Miami, Florida of an apparent heart attack. He was born July 23, 1921.

He was a member of the House Military Affairs Committee, secretary of the Agricultural and Rural Affairs committee and

a member of the Fish and Game Commission.

Shuman was in the U.S. Army as a artillery sergeant for 38 months during World War II, 21 of which were in combat. He held the Bronze Star Medal and five battle stars for service in the European Theater. He was chaplain of the 83rd Inf. Division Association; a member and chaplain of the Harry D. Ziegler Post 6319 VFW and the Frank L. Garbaugh Post 373 American Legion, both of Greencastle.

He was active in numerous other organizations, which kept him quite busy all the time. He is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Isabelle M. Dorer, Mrs. Anita G. Cunningham and Mrs. Suzanne F. Hartman, all of Greencastle, and one brother

Joseph M. Shuman of Wilington, Delaware.

Bill Shuman's death was a shock to everyone that knew him and I'm sure there are a lot of 83rders who are also shocked by this news. He was a member in good standing for as long as I could remember in our Association. We will all miss him very much. Our condolences to his family and friends.

Whereas, the 83rd Infanny Division, together with many others of the Free World, engaged in combat against the Nazi War Machine which was personified by the Arch Criminal Adolph Hitler, and symbolized by the Nazi Emblem, and

Whereas, an avowed purpose of Hitler and his henchmen was the elimination of all non-aryans, including

all jews, and

Whereas, we members of the 83rd Infantry Division saw many of our comrades-in-arms die and many others maimed for life as a result of the anticism exemplified by the Nazi Symbol, and

Whereas, recently this hated symbol has more and more frequently been used in the United States by

hate groups in an attempt to intimidate those of us dedicated to Liberty under law, and

Whereas, these hate groups mis-use the 1st Amendment to the United States Constitution for their subversive purpose as an excuse for their psycological Warfare and this cheapens those principles for which we and our friends fought, bled and died.

Now, therefore, it is here resolved by the 83rd Infantry Division Association Inc., assembled this 19th day of August 1978, that the use of the Nazi Symbol or emblem and what it stands for is not included in the protection afforded by the 1st Amendment and shall be outlawed for use in public

places in the United States.

Be it further resolved, that we call on the Congress of the United States and the governing authorities of the several states to provide appropriate Civil and Criminal penalties against individuals or groups of individuals who display the Nazi Emblem or symbol in any public place and call upon the courts of the land to recognize the rights of citizens to be free of the attempted psycological intimidations by upholding such Civil or Criminal penalties

Be it further resolved, that the Secretary of this Association shall transmit a copy of this resolution to the President, Secretary of the United States Senate, Secretary of the United States House of Representatives, the Chief Justice of the United States Supreme Court and to each of the major News

Media in the United States.
