

Here is a copy of the letter I forwarded to all the Members of the Executive Board and to atleast one member in each Chapter to be read to their members. It came after the last Thunderbolt was mailed to you and by putting it in this one, every Paid-up member will see it and know that we are in search of a member willing to take on the job of Secretary-Treasurer and Editor. The letters and telephone calls pleading with me to stay on the job bave been numerous, but my decision is final. I haven't bad the time to answer all the letters and want to thank everyone for their confidence in me. I appreciate your kind words more than you know.

This is the letter, an exact copy:

To all concerned:

I'm finally caught up with my After-Reunion work load, all applications were sorted, membership cards are filed, the THUNDER-BOLT has been completed and sent to the Printer, and all notes and requests were answered. In a few days the book will be in the mail. Now comes the task of putting out the membership letters and to get all the advertising necessary to keep the Association growing as it has in the past three years. In the advertising department, it is necessary that Jim Prentice and all of our individual writers get to work right away to make this the biggest year ever.

Now for the principal reason for this letter. Before the Reunion in Cincinnati this year, there was a lot of talk about the amount of money in our Association and the fact that it was wrong to keep so much money in the bank accounts. Everybody was coming up with ideas on how to spend the money, never thinking about the fact that I was working toward a FREE REUNION when there was enough money to put it across. From the very beginning, when Bill Doty first suggested the idea, this is what kept me so ambitious, because I knew that one day we were going to have this FREE DELINION.

At the Reunion your vote of confidence was given to me when you voted down the money spending idea. This made me feel completely satisfied, with the thought in my mind that I could keep on working toward the FREE REUNION. Things have changed now that I am home. The letters are coming, I am getting personal slurs thrown at me and it looks as though the idea isn't going to work. There is no end to this. Instead of making friends, I may make a lot of my Buddies go in the opposite direction. Rather than have this happen, I want all of you to know that I am now in my last year as your Secretary-Treasurer and Editor. This announcement is necessary at his time to give you plenty of time to get your selections ready to replace me. I didn't want to let my decision ride until the last minute.

I'm leaving the Association in better financial standing than it has ever been before. I have no regrets for the way I ran this office and I feel that the office has been run the way it should have been run from the beginning. All interest, for me atleast, is gone because with no goal to run for, I feel hopeless. Maybe those with the spending ideas will take the job and do with the money as they please.

It's time to pass the word along to all the members so that a selection can be made as soon as possible for the next Reunion in New Orleans where the members can vote for their choice. My only wish is that those running for the job will do all the work necessary as Secretary-Treasurer, Editor and Auditor of the books for the I.R.S. and the Association. If these jobs are separated, it will add a great deal to the cost of operations and a Dues rise will be necessary almost immediately. The book alone will cost between four and five thousand dollars more per year.

The machines that I purchased on my own to speed up the publication of the book, making stencils here at home, and the Address-o-graph that addresses everything more quickly, along with the Vari-Typer which makes the straight columns for the book, are for sale to the Association if they so desire. You have first choice. Otherwise, if all of you would be so kind as to let me know as soon possible whether you would like to purchase the machines, they will be advertised for sale right after the last THUNDERBOLT for this year is published in June. The price is \$1,500. They will be advertised for much more than that.

By the time of the Board Meeting, the first weekend in May, we should have a lot of information concerning the changeover. Despite the fact that I will be leaving, I'm still going to work this year as before to make it an even better year than the last three, and see if we can't beat that membership mark. I want all of you to know

that this was not an easy decision for me to make. I thought it over and over in my mind before deciding to write this letter. One thing is for sure though, my Doctor, my wife and daughter, my brother and sisters, and all my friends and neighbors are happy that I made the decision. This will finish fourteen years for me as an active Officer in the Association. I can finally get down to the Reunions again and enjoy the real company of my Buddies and friends. It should feel great after all these years. All work and no play is gone forever.

Please pass the word along at your meetings and give everyone

a chance to decide on taking a crack at the job.

This is something that I didn't figure on when I announced that this would be my last year on the job.

We are all grown men. Bad talk should be omitted from our correspondence and in talking to others. Let's just get down to the real business at hand the job of selecting a new Secretary-Treasurer nothing else.

PLEASE - no more of this! PLEASE - cut out the name calling! PLEASE - lets get down to being and acting like the grown men we are supposed to be!

This Association will continue to survive for many more years if we all stick together and enjoy our friendship in harmony with each other. The cussing, the squabbles and dissention are not needed. Anything that is ever said about our Executive Board concerning whether they are good or bad, well, I want to see the complainers take a crack at it. It's not as simple as most would like to think. It is quite costly to each Officer and all their efforts and costs are for your benefit. Let's get off of their backs.

One last memo. I've been asked to publish the letters and to tell you who the calls were from. If the people who wrote the letters and made the calls, have the guts to tell you that's O.K. but I'll never reveal their names to any of you. Some things are better never said. Let's just forget the whole matter, now and forever.





NEW ORLEANS - YOUR HOST CITY

Continuing in our summary of information about New Orleans, we find that it is an International Center for Representatives Citizens of the world. It is dedicated to the creation of closer and friendlier relationships with other countries and serves as a meeting place for Exporters and Importers.

The first two elements of the International Center - The International Trade Mart and the Rivergate International Exhibition facility are located at Eade Plaza where Canal Street meets the Mississippi River. The primary purpose of the Trade Mart Tower is to house firms and organizations which are directly connected in Foreign Trade and business of our great port. There is a Cocktail Lounge and Observation Point at the top of the tower, called "Top of the Mart" from which the whole city may be viewed.

New Orleans has many fine educational institutions, including Tulane and Loyola Universities, two Medical Centers of Louisiana State University and Tulane and two Religious Seminaries. There are more than 460 private, parochial, public and business schools in the city.

A number of Museums hold special interest for visitors. The State Museum is located in Cabildo. The Presbytere and other nearby buildings, and includes many rare exhibits depicting Louisiana History.

The Louisiana Superdome is the largest enclosed stadium in the world, seating 97,000 for auditorium events.

The Vieux Carre is the site of the original settlement of

New Orleans and is also known as the French Quarter. The streets exist today essentially as they were laid out by Bienvilles Engineer on the crescent of the drive that gives New Orleans the nickname "Crescent City". The buildings are built in the European style, with lacy iron balconies and front directly on the sidewalk. They are usually constructed around a patio. Many of the buildings are more than a hundred years old. Here too, is located St. Louis Cathedral, flanked by Cabildo and the Presbytere. Here are located many of the world famous restaurants, and also one of the worlds greatest concentrations of Antique Shops.

New Orleans is both a summer and winter resort, as extreme temperatures do not prevail. Outdoor recreation is possible

during any month.

New Orleans is known the world over for the excellence of its food, and its restaurants enjoy International fame. An unique establishment is Preservation Hall where jazz may be listened to without the usual embellishments of a club type atmosphere, or the serving of drinks or refreshments. This institution normally has a different band each night and is supported by contributions rather than straight admission. New Orleans is generally considered the birthplace of jazz. Many the great names of jazz started out in New Orleans, and new Orleans is an active center of jazz today.

YANKS BREAK STRONG NAZI COUNTER-ATTACK

One of the strongest German counter-attacks launched west of the Rhine in a last desperate attempt to stem the Ninth Army's drive toward the last great barrier to the heart of the Reich was smashed last week some nine miles south of the Neuss in the vicinity of Kapellan on the Erft Canal.

A Company of Infantrymen, Artillery, Tank Destroyers and P-47's dealt repeated blows on Nazi tanks and Infantry trying to cut the main supply route to the forward elements of the 83rd Infantry, busy punching their way to Neuss and Dusseldorf bridges. Seven Tigers were knocked out by the TDs, Bazookas and Artillery, while the air support claimed the destruction of 30 more of an estimated 50.

KAPELLAN FALLS

Co. "I" of the 331st Infantry commanded by Captain Roland Eaton of Lancaster, Ohio, had cleaned out the town of Kapellan on the Erft Canal and were blocking the right flank for the Armored columns advance north. On Friday at 0500 intensive shell fire poured into the town. The Company was completely surrounded by Jerry tanks and Infantry. Tanks were even seen on the open field the Company had crossed the morning before. All avenues of communications and supplies to the trapped Infantrymen were covered. The Doughs got ready.

Lt. Donaldson Robbins of the 908 F.A. from Salt Lake City, began his dash from one post to the other, directing Artillery fire. The 643rd TD's were called from Hemmerden.

TANKS ARE HIT

Several 736th tanks were dug in across the road from the first platoon, led by Sylvester Smith of Medina, NY. The platoon C.P. was shelled. Some of the men took cover in nearby ack-ack pits. Pvt. Roman Perez of Galveston, TX knocked the track off one tank with a rifle grenade while Pvt. Robert Richardson of Dillon, SC and Pvt. Modesto Ojeda of Kansas City, MO blew up another with bazooka rockets. Again Ojeda waited for one of the attacking tanks to roll fairly close. With three well aimed bazooka rounds, he knocked it out. The platoon then withdrew for more favorable positions. They ran into Jerry infantry, killed 20 and took 13 prisoners.

At the western end of town, the second platoon, under Lt. Val Winters of St. Louis was faced with Jerry infantry to their rear and left flank. The GI's opened up. The Nazi's scattered and began to work their way around a building. A German tank coming down the road was directed to their location by a civilian. A few rounds from the tank knocked out a machine gun nest.

PLATOON CUT OFF

Believing the Yanks to have been killed by the tank's fire, the Jerries rushed the building only to be mowed down by riflemen who held their fire until the last moment. But the platoon was soon cut off from the rest of the Co. Sgt. Kenneth Hill of Canton, OH, Sgt. Frank Sarris of McKeesport, PA and P.F.C. Henry Williamson of Oscaloosa, lowa, infiltrated the enemy cordon and made their way to the Regimental C.P. in Hemmerden to tell of their platoon's plight. This town was also receiving a barrage of 88's and men of Regimental Hq's. were preparing to stave off any possible attack directly on them.

Meanwhile, T/Sgt. Carl Hansen's third platoon was

fighting in another part of town, surrounded by enemy tanks and infantry. By this time, P-47's were on the scene. Nothing appeared more beautiful to the men on the ground in the middle of enemy armor, than these planes zooming in and dropping their edds on Nazi tanks and then returning in another dive to strafe the fleeing supermen scrambling from their burning tanks.

ATTACK INFANTRY

The tanks destroyed, the doughs gave their full attention to Jerry infantry. Thirty-four were wounded in the woods directing mortar fire on American vehicles going up the MSR to forward elements approaching Neuss. Their location was radioed to the 908th F.A. Bn, and when the cry "On The Way" was heard, the doughs went out and finished off the last of the attackers.

EAGLE SCOUT

Another medal bas been added to the collection of T/5 Clarence VanLaanen of Seattle, WA, Jeep pilot for Battery "D" 453rd AAA Bn, he holds the Bronze Star, the Purple Heart and three Battle Stars. The new bangle came in a package from home, an Eagle Scout Medal he had earned but not received. Now he's wondering on which side of the Good Conduct Ribbon to wear it.

FOXHOLE FABLES

A Nazi superman turned up at the 308th Medics' clearing station in Elfgin the other day - bale, hearty, bappy and hungry. No wounds - no tag - no fever. He just wanted to surrender. Questioning revealed he bad fallen asleep in a bayloft the night before and awoke in the morning to find himself the lone defender of the town. The Red Cross looked pretty good from where he sat, and breakfast was coming up.

Receiving for the 308th were T/Sgt. Walter T. Sokolski, S/Sgt. John J. Kusic and Tec 5 Harry Vitow.

When enemy shells began hitting in their vicinity, Sgt. Charles R. Reed, Recon Troop Mess Sgt. from Rockford, Illinois, and Tec 5 Walter Albrecht of Flushing, L. I., NY, ducked into a cellar.

They were near an air vent and could hear German civilians talking on the street. Albrecht, who spouts German fluently, reports the only topic of conversation was Hitler - and he was getting an adequate cussing.

DIVARTY HOLDS FIRSTS ON ROER AND RHINE

Several days prior to the crossing of the Roer River by the 29th and 30th Infantry Divisions, all 83rd Artillery Battalions moved from Belgium to Germany. They took part in the heavy 45 minute concentration which leveled Julich and other enemy strong points on the eastern side of the river.

When the 330th Infantry was committed as an attachment to the 29th Division, the 323rd F.A. became the first 83rd Artillery unit to cross the Roer and fire in support of Col. Foster's doughboys.

To the 908th F.A. Bn. goes the distinction of being the first 83rd Artillery unit to fire across the Rhine River. The Battalion pulled into position near the small town of Epsendorf and forward observers were sent out. Within a few hours an enemy OP across the Rhine was sighted. Using

charge seven with a high angle of fire, the battalion fired one volley (12 rounds). This is believed to be the first battalion in the Ninth Army to fire across the river.

MARCHING FIRE OF 331ST SNAPS FINAL NAZI HOLD

How men of the 2nd Bn, 331st Infantry delivered a final blow to the Nazis west of the Rhine River to take hold of their last objective on the river edge was told this week. Confronted by well dug-in gun emplacements and fortified factory buildings, doughboys of "E" and "G" companies closely supported by machine gunners and mortarmen of "H" company, broke through with marching fire to wipe out all resistance and take some 300 prisoners.

Company "E" under Captain Francis Oliver of Brooklyn, NY, jumped off from the Erft Canal about 1,000 yards east of the Rhine about 0400 on Friday. Leading the attack, the second platoon under Lt. Conrad Van Kirk of Independence, MO, was pinned down by heavy machine gun fire. They were silhouetted against a bright moon and were momentarily stopped by heavy enemy fire which continued to rake the open fields.

ADVANCE STARTS

Captain Oliver and Lt. Charles Welch of Columbus, OH, immediately struck out with the first platoon on the right flank and, despite all the fire the Jerries could pour their way, pushed forward through the barbed wire, over Jerry trenches, between and around the factory buildings to reach the river banks at 0500.

But the battle had only begun. Artillery began to fall around the open field and men of the second platoon were forced to hug the ground, their advance still checked. T/Sgt Michael Shiko, S/Sgt George Kahler, Pvt Clayton Warner, Pfc Andy Loy, PfcRobert Weir, Pfc Harold Wrosch and Pfc Harris Bartlett with Van Kirk crowded into one shell hole. "It was one of the toughest spots we were ever in" said Sgt Shiko.

As dawn broke, the barrage lifted. T/Sgt Robert Clofton directed his Company "H" machine guns to spray fire over the heads of the pinned down platoon. This respite gave the second an opportunity to advance again.

COMPANY "G" CHARGES

With the fight still raging at mid-day, Company "G" led by Captain Macaluso of New Orleans struck out in a final assault on "E" company's left flank from the village of Brucke and crossed over 1500 yards of open terrain in the midst of heavy MM direct ack-ack fire coming from across the Rhine. In open waves with fixed bayonets, the doughboys charged. By laying down a base of machine gun fire and then employing terrorizing marching fire, the first platoon, led by Lt. Arthur Spalding of Vermont, and the third platoon converged on the factory buildings from two sides. In the meantime, mortar fire played havoc with the enemy in the trenches, forcing 150 to surrender. The 2nd platoon moved in on the factory site cleaning out the last pockets of resistance and at 1500 resistance was broken.


JUST ANOTHER RIVER

We had quite a trip across France from Troyes to Luxembourg City. A 300 mile excursion where we could see and enjoy the Countryside we were fighting for. We passed the fields of our fathers in W.W. 1, Chateau Thiery, St. Mibiel, Verdun, Chalons and the small and large Cemeteries of both Allies and the Germans.

We drove day and night (sometimes with the headlights on) when those damn cat-eyes would almost put you to sleep while following a Jeep or 6x6 in front of you. Oh! those blessed P.Calls -

Army vehicles weren't easy on your kidneys.

It was in September that Lt. Sam McGill of Colonel Crabills 329th Infantry bluffed the German Commander, Major Gen. Estes into surrendering his 20,000 men to Magills Platoon and a show of force by 16 Thunderbolt Fighter Bombers. (Also protection from the French F.F.I.)

The M.P.'s got some pistols from disarming the P.W.'s - did you? There will be some pictures and reports on Orleans, and Luxembourg in my next Report. I wish all of you had a most Blessed and MERRY CHRISTMAS AND A HAPPY NEW YEAR.

20 SEPTEMBER 1944

The Division continued its mission north of the Loire River awaiting relief by the 94th Infantry Division.

Patrol and Security missions were continued and training was

carried on in all units.

21 SEPTEMBER 1944

Final arrangements were made for the relief of the 83rd Infantry by the 94th Injantry Division. The Division was informed that they

by the 94th injanity Division. The Division was informed that they would begin movement to the east into the XX Corps zone.

The Division issued warning order for concentration in the vicinity of Orleans and Montargis within 48 bours, ready for transport to the east by motor or rail. Combat team 331 was assigned an assembly area east of Esch, Duchy of Luxembourg.

The 83rd Infantry was formerly assigned to Third Army and XX Corps, effective this date.

22 SEPTEMBER 1944

Orders were issued to all units of the Division to assemble immediately in the vicinity of Orleans and Montargis. The 94th Infantry Division began relief of the 83rd Division along the Loire.

The 3rd Battalion of the 330th Infantry was relieved from Task Force "B" and departed from the Daoulas Peninsula in the Brest area to rejoin the Regiment, moving by rail and motor.

The Division Command Post closed at Vendome and opened at

Boigny at 1630.

23 SEPTEMBER 1944

The 331st Infantry Regiment departed Montargis at 0600. Arrangements were made to meet representatives of XX Corps at Arrangements were made to meet representatives of XX Corps at St. Mihiel who would designate further routes and assembly areas in the vicinity of Esch. The Division received operational instructions from XX Corps giving mission of the Division. The Division was given the mission to destroy the enemy in the Remich area, patrol vigorously east to the line of the Moselle - Sauer Rivers and treuent enemy crossing of these misors in the same patrol. prevent enemy crossing of those rivers in its zone. Task Force Polk composed of the 3rd Cavalry Group Reconnaissance, reinforced, was attached to the Division. It was given a sub-sector in the southern portion of the Division sector.

24 SEPTEMBER 1944
Field Order No. 31 was issued stating the mission of the 83rd Infantry Division. The Division was reinforced, was given the missions to relieve elements of the 90th Infantry Division and elements of the V Corps without delay, maintain contact with V Corps and protect the North Flank of XX Corps, destroy the enemy in the Remich area and patrol vigorously to the line Moselle - Sauer Rivers and trevent enemy river crossines in its sector. Rivers and prevent enemy river crossings in its sector.

Instructions were received from the Commanding General, XX Corps, outlining the 112th Infantry Regiment (28th Infantry Division) and Combat Command "A", 5th Armored Division on northern

and Compail Communication of the Company of the City of Luxembourg at 1400, 24 September.

Division Command Post closed at Boigny in the vicinity of Orleans and opened at Luxembourg at 1600, 24 September 1944.

25 SEPTEMBER 1944

25 SEPTEMBER 1944

The 329th Infantry relieved the 112th Infantry at 1200, September and at 1700 relieved elements of Combat Command "A" within its zone. The 3rd Battalion, 329th Infantry closed into its assembly area in the vicinity of Luxembourg at 2100. The 331st Infantry moved into its assembly area and affected relief of Task Force Polk. Task Force Polk shifted to the south, relieving elements of the 90th Infantry Division. Preparations were made for the reduction of the Remich Bridgehead. Units of the 331st Infantry launched a limited objective attack and captured Grieveldange.

26 SEPTEMBER 1944

The Division completed movement into assigned positions in its sector. Dispositions at this time: 329th Infantry on Division left, 331st Infantry in center, Task Force Polk on right flank, 330th Infantry in reserve. Task Force Polk completed relief of elements of the 90th Infantry Division in its zone at 2400.

Along the entire Division in its zone at 2400.

Along the entire Division front, patrols guarded the Moselle River line to prevent any possible enemy crossing. The 329th Infantry established contact with Combat Command "A" of the 5th Armored Division on the Division left flank. The 308th Engineer Battalion made a thorough recommaissance of the Maginot Line defenses in order to secure information for an assault training

The 2nd Battalion, 331st Infantry, sent patrols toward Remich. During the day, the towns of Remersceen and Bous were occupied and enemy opposition in these operations was limited to patrols. A counterattack of approximately one platoon, supported by machine gun fire and mortors, developed from the high ground southeast of Grievedange and was quickly repulsed by our forces.

27 SEPTEMBER 1944
Task Force Polk relieved elements of the 90th Division in its zone during night of 26-27 September. The 329th Infantry captured the towns of Osweiler, Dickweiler and Montach.
The 2nd Battalion, 331st Infantry, advanced toward Remich and knocked out machine guns in concrete emplacements by direct tank fire north of the town. Several towns were captured, including Wallenstein, Bech and Kleinmacher. The Regiment also captured the town of Schengen in preparation for attacks on Leningen, Ehnen and Wormeldange. During these operations, our forces received artillery fire from east of the Moselle River and sustained approximately 30 casualties.
Patrols from Task Force Polk made a reconnaissance in force to vicinity of Manon and took all prisoners.

to vicinity of Manon and took all prisoners.

28 SEPTEMBER 1944

Division continued patrolling west of the Moselle River.
The 1st and 2nd Battalions of the 329th Infantry moved to
positions near the Moselle - Sauer River line. positions near the Moselle - Sauer River line.

The 83rd Cavalry Recomnaissance Troop, on the Division left flank, maintained contact with the 5th Armored Division. The town of Remich was captured by the 2nd Battalion, 331st Infantry at 1210 and the 3rd Battalion captured the high ground northwest of Ehnen against beavy enemy machine gun fire and mortor fire in order to improve defenses along the Moselle - Sauer River line.

A gap was breached in three road blocks at Remich and they were prepared for friendly use in case of counter attack.

Considerable counterbattery fire was employed by Division artillery. Pockets of resistance on west side of Moselle River were being searched out and reduced.

The enemy was employing numerous ambush patrols. There was some evidence of enemy armor fire across the Moselle River in the sector of the 90th Infantry Division to the south.

29 SEPTEMBER 1944

The Division continued patrolling the west bank of the Moselle-Sauer River line and made recommissance for preparing defensive positions in depth against any possible enemy counter attack. Patrols were sent out by the 331st Infantry to Wormeldange. The 331st Infantry occupied Hautekontz and Contz.

Task Force Polk sent out a patrol to verify report enemy tracked vehicles were moving north in the vicinity of Koecking.

Some regrouping of the Artillery took place with view of obtaining maximum support along the entire front. Every effort was made by all units to locate enemy Artillery positions.

A few prisoners were taken.

30 SEPTEMBER 1944

The Division carried on its assigned mission and maintained liaison with V Corps and Combat Command "B", 5th Armored

liaison with V Corps and Combat Command "B", 5th Armored Division, on the left flank at Befort.

The 1st Battalion, 329th Infantry, captured Oberdonven and advanced to within 1500 yards of Grevenmacher. Some enemy patrols were encountered in the 329th Infantry area.

Company "B", 331st Infantry, captured the town of Ehnen against some small arms, mortor and Artillery fire.

Units continued to capture prisoners. Enemy patrol activity increased and counter-measures to punish enemy patrols were taken all along the Division front.

all along the Division front.

One counter attack by an estimated enemy army rifle Company was repulsed near Wormeldange by 331st Infantry.

Training in attack of fortified positions continued.

Task Force Polk attacked the enemy in the vicinity of Gavisse. The attack was supported by a platoon of tanks. Casualties were inflicted on the enemy and prisoners were taken.

Are there any copies of "329 Buckshot Infantry Division" still available? It was the Regimental History published in Wolfenbuttel, Germany right after the War. I have a copy but am interested in getting another.

I'm still working on sending you some photos I took during combat. When the Winter and good weather arrive, I'll be doing more "Indoor work."

"I strongly endorse the resolution passed by the 83rd Infantry Division Association in favor of banning the public display of the Swastica, the symbol of Naziism. I do so not only because of my personal hatred of that symbol (as a Jew) but also because unlike so many Veterans Organizations, the 83rd Infantry Division Association has remembered that World War 11 was not only an adventure to be rapped about over a beer, but a crusade against evil. As you state in the resolution, many of our Buddies were maimed for life and died in that crusade."

"We should never forget what we fought for - and the horror of War. So, as civilians, we should keep the fight against evil going - so that our children and grandchildren

will not have to face the horrors we went through.
