Missing from the women section was Avalon Goddridge and Pearl Derickson. These two stayed home. They don't care for flying. Manny and I will keep at them and do our best to get them there next time. Mr. President.

I am a 83rd man, got with the 83rd in Belgium in Dec. 1944. Went through the bulge, til it all stopped in April 1945, in Icholes Germany across the Elbe River. I received a bronze star citation for sticking my neck out like the dummy I am. At that time, I was proud of my actions

I was in B. Co. 331st, Danny Moore was my Captain til he got killed. After that, Lt. Cres was B Companys Commander. My Platoon leader was Lt. Cutts. I was S/Sg. squad leader of the best darn group in E.T.O. They were, Pozo, Judge, Roll, Killen, Seaman, Shelly, Kilebrew, Childers, & myself. I have lost the rest of my squad. As I said, we were the best! I did not receive a purple heart, for I kept my butt on the ground. One of the men had been with the 83rd from the start, & had about 23 days under fire, he was hit 3 times. Now a man in another plattoon unbuckled his overshoes so snow get into them, purposely. His feet froze, I was told later, he had both feet taken off. Another man purposely shot his knee cap & the end of his big toe. He too was sent back. I never saw him again. I know a Mr. Johnson, here in Ky., who was hurt in basic training, he did not go overseas. He is service connected as are the others I have mentioned. All these are considered Hero's of W.W. 2. Now I'll get to the point. I was in an accident where I got a brain concussion, a broken back. I have 3 metal plates in my right arm. One for each bone. I have been making 2 or 3 trips to V.A. Hospital in Lexington Ky. per month since April 1977. The service connected have priority over me, regardless of how or where they were wounded. They still have their travel pay. The un service connected dont, unless they draw a pension. They also have a 9 per. ct. increase per yr., that the unservice connected don't get. A friend of mine spent 4 yrs. in the South Pacific & is a nevous wreck. He is not service connected! I don't mean to complain about anyone who was under fire getting all they can. But it looks as though, those like me are penalized for not getting wounded.

In short, we are being discriminated against because we did not receive the purple heart. Something should be done!

Since this has been festering inside me for some time, I just want to air it before the 83rd division, & see what others may feel. If you possibly have room in the next Thunderbolt, please print this. My standing is, I am adjecent of D.A.V. Chapter 49, in Junction City Ky.

308th Engineers Co. "C"

Hi Buddies,

I received a nice surprise on Memorial Day weekend. An old war buddy came to California to visit and dropped in to see us.

We had a wonderful time talking of old times together.

We hope to see him at the reunion in Philadelphia. All you 308th Engineers, "C" Co, come to Philly to the reunion and meet all your buddles again.

John Capelli made the trip from Coast to Coast, why can't you make it to Philly.

Hope to see you all at the reunion.

Quinto De Antoni 308th Engineers "C" Co. The first time I saw Major White, later a Colonel, was in a field in the Normandy hedgerows. He had shed his fatigue jacket and was in his under shirt with a belt of machine gun ammo hanging around his neck, holding a machine gun by the barrel with an asbestos glove, and spraying wildly thru the trees surrounding the field. He looked like he was trying to fight the whole war by himself; but let me start at the beginning.

July 4th, 1944 was the big push in the hedgegrows, and three days later after continual pounding from an unseen foe we were still within a hundred yards of our take off point. At this time "B" Co 329th was in battalion reserve, but early one morning we were ordered to replace "C" Co in the line. They had to be in big trouble if we were sent to replace them. Not knowing exactly where "C" Co was located the men of "B"

Co. worked their way along the hedgerows in the direction of the front. The third platoon reached a junction of four fields and as they tried to go thru the cattle gates to the field ahead they were fired upon from the flanks by unseen machine guns. The rapid rate of fire left no doubt who was manning the guns. As "B" Co kept down along a sheltering hedgerow awaiting the next move, one our tanks, the first we had seen, appeared in the field behind, but could only provide covering support because it couldn't get thru the hedgerow. About then a squad leader called back "lets go"! As the first men ran along the hedgerow there was an explosion and three of them were flattened on the ground; but just as quickly as they had gone down they raised their heads, retrieved their rifles and helmets, and with the "lets go" still ringing in their ears took off in the direction of their squad leader. The men didn't know what hit them a rifle grenade perhaps, but they were hardly scrached and though no more of it. As they reached the opening in the hedgerow the order "scouts out" was given. Two men entered the field and proceeded in different directions in search of "C" Co. As the the scout to the right reached mid-field an unbelievable figure emerged from the foliage at the far end of the field. He was a G.I. in his undershirt, his head wrapped in a white bandage his chest crisscrossed with a machinegun belt, and he held the machine gun with an asbestos glove. He swung around and let off a few burst thru the trees, and signaled to the scout to cross the field. Before the scout could relay the signal "B" Co was already pouring over the hedgerow where the other scout had located "C" Co between a double hedgerow. Actually they were in a lane that led from the Carentan-Periers road back into a quaint little country cottage. Gradually "B" Co settled in with the men of "C" Co who immediately drained our canteens. It was their second day without water. Almost all the "C" Co men were wounded, and we wondered what had happened to them. Later we found out the lane was being used as a collection station so that their situation wasn't as serious as it appeared.

Meanwhile the wildman in the undershirt joined us and we found out he was Major White. He had a slight head wound, and when we first saw him in the field he had just routed the enemy machine gunners who had prevented us from reaching "C" Co. He briefed our officers on the situation and after outposts had been established at each end of the lane we spent the next few hours moving the wounded to the rear and bringing up additional ammunition. About noon time the outpost at the paved road fired at Germans crossing the road and carring things on their backs. When Major heard the report, he said they were swinging to our left and advised our company commander to

place all our BAR men at the hedgerow in the rear of the house and back of the barn with instructions to keep down and hold their fire until they could tell where the Greman guns were located, then burn'em out. The word was passed along the lane for everyone to be ready. In a little while some mortar shells dropped around us but they were either short or long and except for a couple of tree bursts none fell in the lane. As soon as the mortars stopped a couple of machine guns opened up from the orchard back of the cottage, trying to angle their fire into the lane. Our company commander, a 1st Lieutenant because we had already lostour Captain, was positioned to the rear of the lane with the company runner, who spoke fluent German. They had a phone line back to our own mortar section who were waiting for fire directions. The runner heard a German shout an order to place a gun in an opening in the hedgerow near the back of the orchard. He pointed to the spot and as the Lieutenant raised his carbine, a tripod and a heavy machine gun dropped into the opening. Two quick shots and the the gun was never manned. The shot seemed to be the signal to start the six BAR's in the back of the house. The mortars joined in and in minutes there was no answering fire. A couple G.I.'s slithered out past the orchard and came back with two fish tail and one heavy machine gun on a tripod, and the only they had seen were "good ones".

When it became apparent the area was "secured" we tended our wounded one BAR man lost a little hair and skin on his head, one Lt. had a belly full of potato-masher splinters, a delightful job to help pick them out, and one rifleman was cut in the cheek by a mortar fragment.

This was the first time the company had faced the foe, and they had performed exceptionally well. Major White complimented them by saying "he wished he had more men like them". They accepted the compliment graciously, but under stood that he had given them the advantage, and the credit for the out come had belonged to him. Never-the-less it had been a badly needed boost to their confidence, and since they had much to learn about fighting a war, they considered themselves lucky to have had such an opportunity.





I'll have another U.S. Army combat picture of the 83rd in the next report.





With the men now leaving our organization to return to the States, we have found from reports drifting back to us, that these men are required to attend a school for two weeks. The purpose of this school is to teach them culture and refinement in order that they may adapt themselves to a far gentle life in the States. The men are all anxious to return home and having a 2

weeks delay is hard to take, so in order to remedy this

we have complied this pertinent data.

After this short course it will be unnecessary for you to attend any school and you may go directly home confident that you are able to mix with any group be it in a salon or saloon. Our course carries the GOOD HOUSEKEEPING SEAL FO APPROVAL.

EXCERPTS FROM OUR SHORT COURSE

1. Upon arriving in America you will be amazed at the large number of beautiful girls you'll see. Remember boys, NEW YORK is Not PARIS. Many of these girls have occupations such as stenographers, sales girls and beauty operators. Therefore, you do not approach them with "How Much!" A proper approach is "Isn't it a beautiful day". or "Were you ever in Scranton". Then you say "How Much".

2. If you are visiting at some-ones home and after spending the night are awaking by a gentle rap on the door informing you that the household is 'arising, the proper answer is "I'll be down shortly", etc. DO NOT

wear your helmet in the house.



The Voraceks are members of Our Lady of Lourdes Church. They belong to Anton Blazek Post No. 2079 of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the Warren, O., chapeter of the 83rd Infantry Division Veterans. They own a catering service. Voracek is a life member and former director of Czech Karlin Hall, 5304 Fleet Ave.



I know that my task as a reporter for G Company would not be complete without writing an article about the officers

that served with the Company.

When I reported to the company in October 1943, I was the low man on the totem pole. Bill Waters was the Commanding Officer, then there was Dellow, Gahn, Davis and on other officer. Being the last one on board, I was assigned to the last Platoon (The Weapons Platoon).

The Division had just come from Maneuvers, and there was a lot of changes being made. When things finally settled down in February 1944, we got the word that we were headed for overseas. To Fill the roster one other was brought in, (Ernest).

This was to be our first string, In Bill Waters, we had an individual that would play the game according to the book, and an officer that excelled in Military Bearing. I learned a considerable amount of leadership from Bill Waters. The other four officers each had their good points, but we would not know how good they would be until we entered into Combat. We did not have long to wait, on July 4th we lost Gahn and Ernest. On the 6th of July, I was evacuated, and Davis got his present shortly after. Dellow, who had taken over the Weapons Platoon was lost a few days later. Within one week only Bill Waters was unscratched. The flood of replacements started to arrive. A couple of officers were brought in while I was in the rear, I never had the opportunity to meet them. Each time an officer was lost, the platoon sergeant would take over the platoon. More replacement officers were assigned to G Company, but once again it is hard for me to name all of the replacement officers. I can recall a few, I was the only one of the original officers to return to the company. There were officers, by the name of Gilmore, Baird, (he stayed with us a short time, then was reassigned at a later date), Spaulding, and Witherspoon.

When I assumed Command of G Company at St. Malo, there were only two officers left, Bill waters had transferred to Battalion Staff. In regrouping after St. Malo, there was a flood of replacements to the Battalion. In G Company we got officers by the name of Berlet, Vollmeer, Balick and McElroy We were in a relative quiet position, and it is good that we were. It gave the officers time to get acquainted with the men. Up to this point we did not have this opportunity. Once we moved on to the offensive, it was evident to me that we needed the young officer rather than the older ones. Berlet did stay with us to the end, but Balick and McElroy, who were in their middle 30's, could not stand the pressure and had to be relieved. Berlet managed to stay with us, but to this date, I don't know how he managed to survive the Weapons Pla-

toon

Vollmeer was one of the young officers, he did an outstanding job, from time to time he was evacuated, but always returned. Baird had returned to G Co after the bulge and he too did an outstanding job with the 2nd Platoon. In Vollmeer and Baird, I had two of the finest officers in the army. They were assigned some difficult tasks, but with the experience they had acquired, both of them always found the right solution. It was a pleasure to have these two officers in G Company.

Somehow, during the course of nine months of combat, there were some 24 officers that passed through the com-

mand of G Company.

There were three officers that I recall Becker, Mote and Graff. In Becker and Mote we had two young officers. Graff had been the Communication Sergeant for the Battalion,

and received a Battlefield commission. He was assigned late in the war and had very little chance to command in combat. Mote had gone to Europe with another company and was a replacement in G Company. I don't think he ever accepted the responsibilities of an officer, when the firing began he forgot that he was an officer and that he was suppose to lead. Becker joined us too late in the game, it took him some time to adjust, but I think he would have made an excellent combat officer. One of the hardest jobs an officer had, was adjusting to the men of his platoon. He would come in as a replacement, he knew very little about the leaders of the platoon and less about the men. His adjustment had to be quick, and in most cases we did not have the time available. That is why it is hard for me to remember the name of all the officers. Some spent too little time with us. I believe that the one thing that made my job a lot easier, was the fact that I knew the men in the platoon, I knew the Sergeants who would be the leaders. This was due to the fact that I had trained with these men in the states and in England before we went into combat. I was no better off than the replacement officer when we first went into combat, I had to adjust to combat conditions, it was one of the toughest things that I ever had to do in my lifetime. Once we got to the area where we had a breather, I realized that I could make the grade, and things would come easy for me. Experience is the best teacher, and the longer you stayed with it, the better the conditions were. In their lies the answer, too many of the officer replacements did not stay with the unit longer enough to gain the experience he needed to lead a platoon in combat.

As time goes on, I realize more and more how fortunate I was to be surrounded by some of the finest officers and men

that served in the Army.

The Dixie Chapter held it's meeting May 17th in Greenville, South Carolina with about 30 people present.





October 1944

A letter of instructions from VIII Corps placed the boundary between 83rd Division Third U.S. Army on the South of STENAY — AVETZ all inclusive to 83rd Division. ROS. SAARBURG, INCLUSIVE TO Third Army; TRIER inclusive to 83rd Division. The Division was ordered to continue its present mission.

The 329th Infantry continued to patrol in its sector from BOLLENDORF to MERTERT. Company K attacked and repulsed a force of 15-30 Germans who had crossed the MOSELLE RIVER into ECHTERNACH.

The 330th Infantry continued patrolling and outposting its sector. Artillerry and morters were fired at targets of opportunity.

The 331st Infantry in Division Reserve continued combat training. The 1st Battalion replaced the 3rd Battalion in the MAGINOT Training Area near HETTANGE GRANDE at 1430. The 2nd Battalion continued training in small unit problems.


