

Dear Members of "L" Company:

I'm trying to locate anyone that may have known my father, the late P.F.C. Robert C. Caine, SN 32366581, who was killed in action somewhere near St. Servan, France. Date of death was August 12, 1944, and his remains were initially interred in plot B, row 9, grave 211, of the U.S. Military Cemetery, St. James, France. He was from Bridgeton, N.J. and he had been given the nickname 'Kill-r Caine" because he used to box in his spare time.

After the death of my father, my mother had to give my older brother and me up for adoption as she wasn't able to raise us on her own. I was born Sept. 24, 1944, after his death, and so he never had a chance to see me. Over the I have met my natural mother, brother, and my father's

relatives.

The family has asked me to try to find out how my father died and if there were any witnesses near-by at the time of his death. Although I never knew my dad I'm making a special memorial case in honor of him. To many he was just another American soldier killed in the line of duty, but to me he will go down in history as a man that gave his life for the freedom of others. No military honors will ever be bestowed upon him, but the memorial case I'm making in his honor will be the best honor given any soldier or father one could ask for.

I understand there were books published in 1945 called "Buckshot" and "Thunderbolt Across Europe". If there is any way to get copies of these books to add to the memorial case it would be deeply appreciated.

My dad's name is listed in the book "Buckshot" on the casualities list from July to August, 1944.

If there is any information you may be able to supply me with, it would be deeply appreciated by the Caine family and myself.

FROM THE OLD OFFICE

LOOKING FOR INFORMATION:

I am writing a narrative whose climax will feature the 83rd. Infantry Division in combat in Brittany during August of 1944. Any assistance or guidance you may wish to provide in securing certain **documentary** information would be deeply appreciated.

This true story will tell the experiences of six American enlisted men (among them myself) as Prisoners of War, together with our captors in the German 77th Infantry Division, in a sixteen day period during most of which we were under attack by the 83rd, other Units, and Aircraft in various parts of coastal Brittany (with the 77th were some remnants of the 5th Para-

chute Division, the 17th S.S. Panzer Grenadier Division, and a Pioneer Unit of German led Russians.)

While memory has dimmed somewhat, two P.W.'s, "Shorty England from Dalton, GA, and a tall, thin man called "Smitty", who also may have been a southerner, may have belonged to the 83rd.

I would indeed be grateful to receive the following information, or suggested sources:

- 1. Full name and address of Major Shaw.
- 2. Identity of Major Shaw's Unit on August 15, 1944.
- General Macon's mailing address. (If furnishing the officer's addresses is contrary to policy, I would be happy to hear from them by mail.)
- 4. The address of any eyewittnesses to August 15.
- 5. Present location of Official record (or Combat Log) for August 15 made by the Unit or Units which captured the 77th Division and liberated it's six prisoners at Hill # 26 (Festung Paulus) in vicinity of St. Brieuc, Brittany. Hopefully the six prisoner's names, ranks, and Serial Numbers would be included.
- A record (perhaps included in the above log) of the names and ranks of the German 77th Division Staff Officer's.
 - 7. The number of 83rd personell killed or wounded in combat against the 77th.
 - The number of 77th killed or wounded and captured by the 83rd.
 - 9. Verrification that St. Brieuc was the town to which the P.O.W.'s were taken by the 83rd.
 - All information should be sent to:

331ST INFANTRY PLAQUE REPORT

I think most of you are aware that the Plaque for the 331st Infantry Regiment was erected in Graven-macher last September, and a real beauty it is. The people of Luxembourg went all out to make it elaborate as possible and I'm sure that all of you will agree that it is super. We now have three Plaques for the 331st, one in Sainteny, France, the other in St. Hilaire and the one in Luxembourg.

I was able to collect \$1,702.00 toward the cost of this project. The Plaque cost us \$728.70 and expenses (including the Plaque) were \$1,109.25. We have \$592.75 left to send to Gravenmacher for their costs. The photos are self explaining. I hope you like the job they have done for us.

If you ever plan on going to Europe, don't miss this sight. It's a beauty. I plan to thank them on my next tour in May.





I am looking for information regarding a particular Unit of the 83rd that was in Schonebeck, on the west bank of the Elbe River in Germany on April 26, 1944. I don't think it was more than a Platoon in strength because it was only a Lt. in charge. The Unit was guarding the west side of the bridge which the Germans had blown to keep the Americans from crossing to the east side.

At that time the War was drawing to a close and an agreement had been reached by the Russians and the Western Allies that the Americans would do the same on the eastern side. No one was to cross from either side.

German civilians, deserting Germans, foreign people forced in German labor camps and a couple hundred American P.O.W.'s tried crossing the bridge to the American side but were turned back. I, and some of my Buddies were amongst the P.O.W.'s trying to cross but were turned back when one of the G.I.'s started to swear in the filthiest, fowlest language you ever heard. That was the password! They turned the others back but let us cross.

Eventually, the 83rd Division sent some boats across to the east bank to pick up the rest of the G.I.'s.

I would like to know: Which platoon from which Company, of which Regiment was at the bridge that day? What was the Lieutenant's name? What was the name of the town at the other end? There was a War

Correspondent there who took down our names. What was his name?

I'm writing because I want to ascertain the facts. One of the fellows was a Henry L. Garrity of Pittsburgh, PA.

Thank you in advance for any help I may get.

Our sympathy goes to Jake's wife, Billie, and to their three children, Pricilla, Jake, Jr. and Susi.


We look forward to our Christmas party in Gatlinburg, Tenn. the first week-end in December. This has always proved a very good time for everyone attending.

Dear Bob,

Back in 1979 "Thunderbolt" printed several of my pictures of "C" Co., 329th. Here are three more. They are shots of "C", 329th's Thanksgiving Day, 1944 feast in Berburg, Luxembourg. One shows the 1st Squad at the table. The fuzzy face in the foreground is Fred Goosens. He is alive and well in Brewster, N.Y. We, and our wives, spent a pleasant evening together recently. On his right is Steve Kopacki. Next to him, with the glasses, is me-and behind me is Dills. Across the table facing the camera with a wine glass is, I believe, Blanchard. Standing behind him is "Big Dick". That is all I can remember. Within a month or so at least four of the men in the picture were wounded in action.

One photo shows the officers. On the extreme left is Lt. Williams. In the middle, leaning on the table is the C.O., Capt. Luther, W.I.A. a couple of weeks later and replaced by Capt. Addelman. On the extreme right is Lt. Barkman, Exec. Standing is Lt. Snyder. I believe the other men were guests from Battalion.

The third photo is a general view of the "banquet hall" - which was the Town Hall of Berburg. Note the blackout "curtains" over the windows. We were only a few miles from the German lines. The dishes were collected from the house in town (the civilians had all been evacuated to the rear). So they could be returned the number of each house was marked on each piece. Unfortunately the K.P.s did their job too well and all the numbers were wiped out. When we left town we just piled all the dishes on a table in the Town Hall. I would have loved to have been there when the townspeople

sorted it all out. By the way, these pictures were taken by a civilian photographer brought in from Luxembourg City.

Berburg was the town from which we left for training in the Maginot Line back in France. Before we left several of us were billeted in a cafe-Cafe Meyer, in front of which I was photographed. While we were gone the Germans lobbed a few shells into town and Cafe Meyer was burned out. I have a photo to that. In 1963 my wife and I were in Europe and we visited Berburg. Cafe Meyer was there again, exactly as before the shelling in 1944 - and again photographed by me.

On that trip we also visited Gravenmacher in Luxembourg. "C" Co. was holed up there in the cellar of a winery right on the Moselle River, just across from the Little Siegfried Line. It was called Caves Bernard-Massard. That is where, because the water supply was shut off, we flushed the toilet with buckets of wine taken from the tremendous vats in the cellar that ran back into the hillside. There was tragedy too, in Gravenmacher. Several men were killed and wounded by booby traps planted by German patrols that crossed the river at night.

Sorry we cannot make the Reunion. We will be in England visiting my daughter and grand-daughter who live there.

What I have sent in for this issue is a lot lighter than my usual repertoire. Some of you may never have known that we had a "Divisional Mascot". - Gilbert.






The artist, N.S. Firfires, was a member of the outfit. - 308 Engr. Bn. I knew him well - a regular G.I.





This is all the news for now. The deadline is close. I would like to say again that it was great to see all my friends in the organization and I am looking forward already to next year.



Mid-Year Report of the President to VBOB Members

What is six-months old, healthy, growing, and blessed with much potential for a long and prosperous life? You answered correctly if you said the Veterans of the Battle of the Bulge. This report is geared to bring you up-to-date and to provide a vehicle for increasing your membership.

First of all, may thanks to all who have given so much time, talent, and effort in behalf of VBOB - many thanks, also, to those who have so generously made financial contributions. Veteran and unit publications as well as local newspapers, likewise, merit our sincere thanks as well as radio stations in Alabama and Europe. Great support has come from division and separate unit associations and we really appreciate it; in fact, it has become a mutually beneficial relationship.

As of today we have 1,219 members -- 1,152 are ground and air veterans, 66 are associates, and one is a unit, the 705th Tank Destroyer Battalion. Looking at our first thousand veteran members, as a sample, most are from Pennsylvania, New York, Virginia, Maryland, and Florida and all states (except Alaska), Mexico, and Botswana, South Africa are represented. The three airborne divisions, 17th, 82nd, and 101st, are neck and neck members while the armored divisions are led by the 4th, 3rd, and 9th and the infantry

divisions by the 84th, 28th, 106th, 75th, and 99th; these units account for about 75% of the total. The remainder consists of members from Army and Air Corps higher headquarters and separate units. The associate members are from 21 states, England, Belgium, and Luxembourg. They are relatives or friends of members, military buffs, or individuals greatly interested in the Battle of the Bulge and provide an additional dimension of knowledge and the potential for international growth and continuing existence.

Input to the Museum and Library continues to roll in. At the end of May we had three books, 10 articles, 16 other documents, two maps, two photographs, and one propaganda leaflet. These consist of unit histories, personal reminiscences, unit newsletters and reunion programs and other meaningful accounts of Battle of the Bulge experiences. Be sure when sending in to include a presentation or donation statement or letter which specifically states that researchers may use the material. Your unit and parent organization are important and should be included also. Artifacts and other such items are expected later. No decision has been made as to the location of the M&L; two institutions have indicated a willingness to provide space and an offer of land has been made.

Here are some highlights of the meeting of the Executive Council on May 8, 1982; The treasure is in good shape thanks in large part to the donations made by many of you and due to good management...The logo, to be re-designed somewhat, will retain the basic circular shape in three equal segments portraying fighting elements, the weather, and other aspects... A medal is being considered...The constitution con-

tinues to be refined... Memorials, monuments, and memorial ceremonies were discussed...Progress is being made on a longrange growth plan relative to state and other chapters; the name Ardennes will not be used for chapter designations...Lifetime memberships are under consideration... A flyer, appropriate for posting on bulletin boards, is being developed... A commemorative stamp, a musical composition, and a trip to the battle are are planned for 1984...The annual membership meeting will be held in the Washington, D.C., area, around December 16, 1982, the date that The New York Times is expected to publish a crossword puzzle about the Battle of the Bulge...VBOB continues to be run on an all-volunteer basis, no fulltime personnel or paid staff...The next issue of The Bulge Bugle is due out in September.

The first public formal VBOB event occurred on Memorial Day when a wreath was placed at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National in the branch identifies an east Cemetery.

We are making good progress in achieving our objectives which are: To foster international peace and goodwill, to promote friendship, perpetuate the memory of the sacrifices involved, and to preserve historical data and site.
