



Kicked up by tanks, which they always cussed.



Hardly time for a smoke it seemed Before that hard-boiled sergeant screamed. "Chow time at last," the private sighed, "Another mile and I think I'd have died." Then, settling down in relaxation, He opened his lunch with expectation. "Au Nertz, the same old cheese and dog," He grinned, as he leaned against a log. "When I was back in the old home town, Cheese-on-rye had a pleasant sound; But when this is over and I get a break, I'm gonna eat nothin' but chicken and steak." Though that dog and cheese was not so hot, Yet, when you're famished they hit the spot. And you quench your thirst and think it's fine, Though the water tastes like iodine. 


Sign at Main Gate, Camp Breckinridge, Morganfield, Ky.




Old Glory, Camp Breckinridge, Morganfield, Ky.




One of the Fine Guest Houses, Camp Breckinridge, Morganfield, Kentucky.




USO Club, Morganfield, Kentucky, 1 1/2 Miles from Camp Breckinridge.









Later, after the funeral services, Al and Anna Belvedere spoke with us about Joe and at that time they both went back into the past to remember their good friend. The memories were warm and sincere, and I would like to share some of

them with you.

Joe and Al Belvedere grew up together and were always close friends. They played sports in their neighborhood during the week, and then attended the jitterbug dances on the weekends. They were happy and carefree times for them, as well as for us. There was a close group in their area that started friendships early, and these friendships continued when they were young men and found themselves all inducted into the service on the same day. Before going overseas, a number of them became members of the 83rd Infantry Division, and Joe was one of them. He joined the Philadelphia Chapter in 1955 and was one of the first members to serve in the Firing Squad and the Color Guard. In the past he also served as Chapter President and Chapter Secretary.

Over the years these friends have kept in close touch with each other, and sometimes when they get together at Chapter meetings, the neighborhood stories and the war stories have now become intertwined so that the laughter and humor have no start or finish -- just warming and sometimes embellished memories that do not seem to fade with time.

Al Belvedere recalls too those years when Joe was a member of the Comics Division of the New Year's Mummers' Parade. As he was outgoing, this became a natural for him and a tradition to be continued, which he did well

As to his family, there were strong ties among all of them. Both Joe and Olive always worked hard in getting family and friends to attend our Philadelphia Chapter functions, and their group could always be counted on to provide a fun evening.

One noteworthy observation: It is not often that one sees a seventy year old man so mourned, openly and sincerely, by the young male members of his immediate and extended family. Their grief was an unspoken tribute to a man who lived among his own with a humor and caring that touched and enriched those around him and particularly those young and impressionable lives.

At the services for Joe, the members of our Honor Guard in uniform included Harry Stevenson, George Pletcher, Al Belvedere, Harry Kirby, Lou Volpi and John Daum.

Joe was a fine soldier. He will be remembered.



Hello Robert:

Just a short note to let you know that I am enclosing my dues for the coming year 91-92.

I am hoping that you and Pearl are doing well & that Pearl has recovered from her accident.

I have been looking through Division book & I haven't seen anyone from "Charlie Company" 330th Inf. Regt. or Hq Co. 330th Inf. 1st. Bn. I took Basic training with "Charlie Company' & stayed until Tenn. Maneuvers, then after we walked to Cp. Breakenridge I was transferred to 1st. Bn. Hg. Co. 330th Inf. into the Anti-Tank Platoon. I stayed with the Anti-Tank-Platoon until I was wounded on the 8th of July 1944. I was in the Aid-Station when the German's over-ran the place. We were finally rescued by our Engineers, they escorted to the other Aid-Station, we were checked over then moved out to the beach where we were flown to England. While I was in the hospital in England I received a letter from my Father telling me he had received a telegram from the War-Department that I was missing-in-action, & I wrote him back I was not missing because I was in the hospital in England. I rejoin my outfit sometime in January located in a small town somewhere in Belgium-(Fron-Le-Compe), I think that is the way to spell it. I stayed with the unit until the war was over, then I was one of the hundreds of men that was transferred to the 8th Arm'd. Div. to bring the colors back to the states, then process to be discharged from the Army. I went to work in Washington DC, for about ten months then was transferred to Atlanta, Ga. April 1, 1946 I enlisted in the US. Army Air Corp. I spent over 20 years in service, went to Korea Dec. 1950 returned May 1952 was stationed at Ft. Bragg until Sept. 1954, transferred to Ft. Eustis, Va. & forty-five days later was on orders for Germany, spent 35 1/2 months in Germany, sent back to the States to Ft. Knox, Ky., discharged Nov. 1958, stayed out of Army for 6 days, re-enlisted at Ft. Jackson for six years. 1961 when the Berlin-wall was put up I was sent back to Germany & assigned to the 8th Inf. Div. 16th Inf. Battle-Group Hg. I stayed in Germany for 4 years then returned to the States and put in my request for Retirement &\* retired in August the last day of the month 1966.

I guess I will close for now.

To: All 83 Inf. Div. Assoc. Members

It is with great pleasure and satisfaction that I find myself among you today.

I greatly enjoyed the unexpected visit of twenty veterans and their spouses to St. Briac, two years ago.

However, we had to be brief, as the veterans also wanted to visit other places they had liberated: therefore, they only had a few minutes to gather in front of the memorial erected in St. Briac in honor of the Americans who had lost their lives in combat for the liberation of our city.

I felt a deep regret after the veterans' departure not having been able to make symbolic gesture of recognition toward those dear soldiers of the American Army who had given us freedom.

I shall endeavor today, by offering the medal of honor of the city of St. Briac to rectify this omission and to prove that we have not forgotten the bravery, the devotion, and the glorious victory of the American Army. Also thanks to whom France and many other countries had regained their freedom.

Following the war, the population of St. Briac had begun funding for a memorial to be built in a public park in honor of your dead: a captain and two privates First Class.

Ever since August 15, 1945, on the anniversary of the liberation of St. Briac, the citizenry holds a parade in front of the memorial on which today the American and jFrench flags unfurl, and a commenorative ceremony takes place.

Our meeting today and the presentation of the Medal of Honor of our city to the 83rd Infantry Division shall confirm and reassure our gratitude toward the entire American Nation.

In conclusion, I thank my son-in-law, Major, A.R. Colter, (ret.) for assisting me in my desire to arrange this meeting.

Upon returning home, I shall arrange an exhibit of photographs that Mr. Tony Vaccaro has generously offered to put at our disposal.

This will probalby occur in 1992 and thus enable us to contribute to the memory of this extraordinary Victory of World War II. Thank you for having come and be assured of my efforts that the memory of your bravery and sacrifices during this famous odysey shall stay alive.

This Iraq situation has somehow caused me to start reliving WWII all over again. I have a grandson who is now a 1st Lt. with a combat engineer battalion in Germany and his unit has just been alerted to ship out to Saudi Arabia in the next two or three weeks. This takes meback to Camp Atterbury waiting for our call to the port.

Then the short stay at Camp Shanks, N.Y., followed by the stay in England waiting for D-Day.

My thoughts went on from there all the way to the Elbe.

All of this got me in the mood to want to talk to some of you guys about the old WW II days. I went on to my full thirty-year career so I had other experiences, but none like quite the same as those with the 308th; what a great outfit that was! I can't believe today's outfits can perform like that one did.

All of this adds up to what I said earlier, I am going to make every effort to get to the next reunion. I presume I will receive some information later as to exactly when it is to be and exactly where "The Pines" is. Please let me know if you think I will not get it as a matter of routine.

I am still in pretty good health for my age. I guess we are all getting up there now. I am fully retired now except that I have been asked to go down to the Washington Transit Authority about 2 or 3 times a month on a consultant basis to advise them on a couple of contracts that have gone sour. Other than that I play golf about three times a week. Mrs. Dodge is well too except for a couple of artificial knee joints and some foot arch trouble. # During husband's captivity Mrs. Tice maintained positive outlook

Cynthia Tice, the wife of Air Force Maj. Jeffrey S. Tice, said she survived the ordeal of her husband's 46-day captivity in Iraq by keeping her and her children's outlook as normal and positive as possible.

"I never looked at it in terms of 'would I get him back?' I always thought it was just a matter of time," Mrs. Tice said Thursday night during a banquet in her husband's honor at the Perkasie Owls Club attended by 125 people.

A group of residents stood an applauded as the Tices arrived at the Owls Club, waving hand-held American flags.

Maj. Tice, who lost about 43 pounds on a starvation diet while a POW, sat down to a meal of ham, turkey and mashed potatoes.

Also at the dinner were Maj. Tice's parents, Josephine

and Darwin Tice of East Rockhill Township.

Mrs. Tice, who spent much of the night looking after their two daughters, Jessica, 7, and Amanda, 3, said she tried to maintain a daily routine in her home in Spain during her husband's captivity.

"I kept life as normal as I could," she said.

"When I found out he was shot down, I was hopeful because I knew (other Allied pilots) had seen a good parachute" belonging to her husband. "So I knew he was OK. It was just a matter of who got to him first."

Unfortunately, Maj. Tice was taken prisoner before he could be rescued.

Three days later, Mrs. Tice saw her husband on television after the Iraqis had made videos of captured Allied pilots.

Even that was cause for optimism, she said.

"He was speaking clearly and sharply, and he looked OK," she said. However confident she was, Mrs. Tice acknowledged she had help while waiting for her husband's return home. "I had a lot of support," she said.

Among the flag-wavers who cheered Tice was Debbie Ansbach of Perkasie, who attended the banquet with her friend, Kathleen Romendio, who brought her children Emily, 8, and Jason, 13.

"We just want to welcome him back and give him support," said Ms. Amsbach. "We're just glad things worked out the way we wanted them to."

She called Maj. Tice "a humble person, and that's a tremendous quality to have."

# Biller played role of Mother Nature

UNION TWP. - From the ponds and lake he built, to a tree limb forming the letter "B", Owen Biller has left a lasting imprint on his wooded wonderland.

Biller and his wife, Mildred, bought 78 acres of useless farmland in 1957 and transformed it into a nature haven at 640 W. County road 100N.

Born in Gary, Biller moved to Porter County to "escape gangism" which had plagued their two sons in the Gary schools.

"I wanted to find a place where the boys could learn everything, where they could go fishing and learn how tools work," Biller said.

"When I bought the land, it looked like a strip mine. The previous farmer didn't know what he was doing."

From 1957 to 1964 nothing -- not even weeds -- grew on the adobe, brick-like surface. Once, he planted wheat in one section, but birds ate the crop.

Before the Billers moved into their present home in 1969, the family lived in a brick house at the entrance to the property. Bricks for the home, constructed about 120 years ago, were from the Hobart Brick Yard.

Biller, a 40-year employee of U.S. Steel, used his electrical engineering skills in developing the natural sanctuary.

"I looked for a site for 12 years. I've wanted to make

a lake ever since I was a boy."

While growing up, he and his brother, Marvin, began to develop lake constructing abilities. Marvin, who lives south of Owen, has built three of his own ponds.

One of the property's numerous highlights is what Biller calls the biggest washout in Porter County. Before he moved there, water from heavy rainfalls would rush downstream, developing a gaping hole in the earth.

Formed from what he called improper farming techniques, the washout is about 50 feet deep and 150 feet across. It took a lot of work and trees to remedy the erosion, he said.

Underfoot is original buffalo grass, grown from seed here years ago.

Almost everyday, Biller walks the property on trails fit for both man and machine.

"You make the laboratory, and other birds and wildlife will find it," said Biller, pointing to tracks of various creatures.

While he had a zoologist job lined up at Brookfield Zoo in Chicago, the depression halted those plans. Instead, he used the bulk of his vacation time to build his own sanctuary.

On the diverse trees and flowers, one of his favorites is the rose pink, an orchid.

Biller, who credits his wife with tremendous assistance, said it would be almost impossible for another enterprising nature buff to perform a similar transformation today. Bureaucreatic red tape would get in the way.

Sometimes, he treats children from Central Baptist Church in Hobart to sleigh rides on a silver chariot, pulling the young ones on three miles of trails with a tractor.

"The most difficult part of the job with building the lake and ponds was the earth-moving, getting the area cleared. I needed my sons and brothers to help with that part."

At a recent county Board of Zoning Appeals meeting, Biller came under fire from nearby residents. He plans to sell the property to a developer who wants to turn it into a subdivision.

"My health is not the best, and I want to move to Tennessee to live near my two sons. The developer has told me he wants to keep it as much as possible how it is now."

Biller's property, which he's been trying to sell for 12 years, would be converted into two-acre lots.

"I'll leave with mixed emotions. I put 35 years of my live into this place."

The couple's sons, Tom and Douglas, each have six acres side-by-side on Lake Chickamauga. Owen and Mildred plan to live somewhere in their sons' own nature habitat.
