Gen. Ramsey commanded the 83rd Division from 1946-1960. It had 18,500 troops and 100% combat equipment, and was one of 6 combat-ready Reserve Divisions during those years.

OBITUARY

MAJOR GENERAL RUSSELL A. RAMSEY died February 20, 1991, following extended illness at the age of 86. He was a lifelong resident of Sandusky, Ohio until 1975, when he and his wife Louise, also a Sanduskyan, retired to Gainesville, florida. His wife preceded him in death on July 13, 1990.

Russell Ramsey attended the Sandusky Public Schools and Howe Military School in Indiana. He graduated from Princeton University cum laude in 1925, where he was active in polo, gymnastics, and Army ROTC. Declining a regular Army commission, he went on to the University of Michigan Law School, graduating in 1928. Initially, he was affiliated with his father Russell K. Ramsey, in legal practice, then established a separate law firm with other partners.

Ramsey was a highly successful President of the Community Chest, forerunner of the United Way, during the peak depression years. Commissioned in the Army Reserve in 1925, Ramsey became a captain and Battery Commander of Battery E, 135th Field Artillerty, Ohio National Guard. After that unit was federalized in 1940, Ramsey spent 37 months in the Asian-Pacific Theater, rising to the rank of colonel and serving as Chief of Staff of the 37th Infantry Division. He was awarded the Silver Star, the Legion of Merit, the Bronze Star w/V for Valor, the Combat Infantry Badge, and the Purple Heart for wounds received in the recapture of Northern Luzon.

After World War II, Ramsey was associated in legal practice until 1974 with William E. Didelius. In 1946, he was promoted to Brigadier General and Commanding General of the 83rd Reserve Infantry Division of Ohio, attaining the rank of Major General (2 stars) in 1954.

Ramsey was also active in civic, business, and church leadership. He served as President of the Sandusky Kiwanis Club, Vice President of the Western Security Bank, President of the Board of Good Samaritan Hospital, Senior Warden of Grace Episcopal Church, Ethics Committee Chairman of the Ohio Bar Association, Lay Member of the Ohio Standing Board of the Episcopal Church, and in many other posts of distinction.

Subsequent to his retirement in Gainesville, Florida, Ramsey continued his active role in community service. He was instrumental in the establishment of a shelter for abused women, and a temporary refuge for transient disaster victims.

Ramsey's death occurred following partial hospitalization with progressive cardiovascular illness.


He was K.I. A. August 8th, 1944 and was born in Kentucky.

Francois is along side the "Cross that marks his place"


The post cards are from towns, which we will never forget, in Normandie.



THE AMERICAN BATTLE MONUMENTS COMMISSION NORMANDY AMERICAN CEMETERY AND MEMORIAL

The Normandy American Cemetery site was chosen because of its historical location on top of a cliff overlooking famous Omaha Beach which was the scene of the greatest amphibious troop landing in history. The cemetery site covers 172 acres. The maintenance of the cemetery and memorial is the responsibility of the American Battle Monuments Commission. Construction of this cemetery and Memorial was completed in 1956 and dedicated on 19 July of that year. The architects for the cemetery were Harbeson, Hough, Livingstone @ Larson of Philadelphia, Pa. The landscape architect was Markley Stevenson, also of Philadelphia.

There are 9,386 American War Dead buried here. 307 of the headstones mark the graves of "Unknowns". The remains of approximately 14,000 others originally buried in this region were returned home at the request of their next of kin.

The Memorial consists of a semi circular colonnade with a loggia at each end. On the platform is a 22 foot bronze statue, the "Spirit of American Youth", a tribute to those who gave their lives in these operations. Around its base is the inscription "MINE EYES HAVE SEEN THE GLORY OF THE COMING OF THE LORD". The sculptor was Donald De Lue of New York City. On the walls within the south loggia are 3 battle maps engraves in the stone and embellished with colored enamels. These maps were designed by Robert Foster of New York City from data furnished by the American Battle Monuments Commission. They were executed by Maurice Schmit of Paris. The panels in the ceiling of the loggias are of blue ceramic by Gentil & Bourdet of Paris. At the entrance to each loggia are two large bronze urns, also designed and sculptured in high relief by Donald De Lue and cast by Marinelli foundry of Florence, Italy.

On the east side of the Memorial is the semi-circular Garden of the Missing. Inscribed on its walls are the names, rank, organization and State of 1,557 of our Missing. They gave their lives in the service of their country but their remains have not been identified, or they were buried at sea in this region.

The circular Chapel, whose mosaic ceiling, designed and executed by Leon Kroll of New York City, symbolizes America who gives her farewell blessing to their sons as they depart by sea and

air to fight for her principles of freedom. Over the altar, a grateful France bestows a laurel wreath upon Dead who gave their lives to liberate Europe's oppressed peoples. The return of Peace is recalled by the Angel, the dove and the homeward bound ship.

At the western end of the main axis of the cemetery are 2 Italian granite (Baveno) figures by Donald De Lue representing the United States and France.

At the Memorial one can descend a flight of granite steps to an overlook parapet on which is situated an orientation table that indicates the various landing beaches. In the early morning hours on 6 June 1944, three Airborne Divisions, the U.S. 82nd and 101st, the British 6th, dropped behind the beaches to destroy enemy forces and to cover the deployment of seaborn assault troops. At 6:30 hours, under the cover of intense naval and air bombardment, six U.S., British and Canadian divisions landed in the greatest amphibious assault recorded in history.


From the overlook, a visitor can walk to the beach and get a better idea of perils of those who stormed ashore on that June morning.

UTAH BEACH MONUMENT


The Utah Beach Monument erected by the American Battle Monuments Commission, with the approval of the French government, commemorates the achievements of the American Forces of the VII Corps who fought in the liberation of the Contentin Peninsula from 6 June to 1 July 1944. It consists of a red Baveno granite obelisk surrounded by a small, developed park overlooking the historic sand dunes of Utah Beach, one of the two American landing beaches during the Normandy Invasion of June 1944.

POINTE DU HOC RANGER MEMORIAL

The Pointe du Hoc Ranger Memorial is the battleground where Lieutenant Colonel James E. Rudder's 2nd Ranger Battalion scaled the 100 foot cliffs on D-Day morning, 6 June 1944, to seize this fortified enemy position which controlled the landing approaches to Omaha and Utah beaches. The Memorial consists of a simple granite pylon atop a concrete bunker with inscriptions in French and English on tablets at its base. This site, preserved by the French, was transferred to the United States Government by formal agreement on 11 January 1979 in Paris. This battle scarred area remains much as the Rangers left it on 8 June 1944.

I talked with Leonard Prelutsky last week, he and his wife seem to be in good health.





We were all rather new to the Omaha area as none of us had been in that part of the country before, but by the end of the week, we had enjoyed our stay so much that we were a little reluctant to leave

We arrived on Wednesday afternoon and the very next morning our sightseeing began. By bus we went from the hotel to Boys Town and that was an experience not quickly forgotten. To begin with, the country is beautiful and the dedication by the faculty and staff at that center is obvious. Our tour guide, who boarded our bus at the Visitors' Center, just graduated from high school and had earned a scholarship for college to begin in September. He was relaxed with us, and a good guide. Among a few of the many things we learned ----. To begin, the town has its own police and fire departments on the premises. As the boys get older, there are attractive homes on the premises and each is occupied by a married couple who take responsibility for the development of their charges. For part of the day, and for several hours a day, each boy has a choice of either a sports activity or an occupational activity tied in with the farm and gardening programs that keep the grounds and the gardens productive and attractive. As the boys get older, they then receive a small salary for the increase in the responsibilities they have undertaken. They receive half of this salary each month, and the second half is put into a fund for them to be received at graduation. Our tour guide, by the way, had graduated recently and had earned a scholarship to college beginning in September.

We learned too that there is now a new addition to Boys Town. At the present time there is housing for fifteen girls who are now residing there. Father Flanagan had started his missionary efforts with five boys, and as this serious need for homes for girls became apparent, the building of attractive housing was started, as well as the selection of couples to occupy the homes with the girls. As with Father Flanagan's original effort to take in five boys, five girls were selected at a time to meet the need for help in this area. The number of girls has now increased to fifteen, and with the amount of ground available, expansion in all probability will continue.

In the course of our tour, we were taken through the new chapel built for Jewish and non-Catholic children. It had just been completed and fits right in with the surrounding architecture.

There is thought and dedication all around you, and as you continue through the large and sprawling landscape you start to absorb a part of it. This whole concept of education and discipline, as well as healthy relaxation, stays with you.

The following day, Friday, we visited the Henry Doorly Zoo in the Omaha area which contains some rare and endangered species, such as the white tiger, the snow leopard and the red panda. On this same expanse of land, the Lied Jungle was created. It is

a 1 1/2 acre re-created rain forest representing Asia, Africa and South America. What is so remarkable about this rain forest is the creation of man-made rocks to illustrate the appearance of the jungle, as well as narrow passages and at times high bridges that extend over an area at a safe distance below where large jungle animals are free to roam.

On Saturday morning the business meeting was held, and then that evening the banquet was held. The staff with the responsibility for the dinner, as well as for the decorations in the ballroom, is to be commended. Everything was so well done.

Traffic to the airport was brisk on Sunday morning, and we left with warm memories of a very special reunion, and very special people whom we had not seen for such a long time.

Shortly after Batesville Frances Roberts reported that Wally fell and put a knot on his head blacked both eyes and bent his glass-







Dear Paul and All,

I did not mean to take so long in answering your letter. Time seems to go so fast. As I had said to you before, that morning I had been hit in the shoulder, and as I went past the aid station, I thought to have the medic put some iodine and a bandaid on to keep out the dirt. As I walked through the door, he gave me a shot of morphine, put a tag on me, and said I was to be sent back to the field hospital for the kind of aid I needed. Shortly thereafter, and very quickly, a tank and several Germans arrived at the station and took everybody who could walk as prisoners.

I have in a way lost time as we moved (of course, walked) back into deeper German territory. It was perhaps three or four days and I think we were at Chartrez, France, when we were finally loaded on to box cars to be taken to the camp. (Stalag IV B). By this time there were probably over one hundred or so of us gathered together. We probably spent something like four or five days traveling by train. In this camp, one half were English airmen, the other half american men, with possible 15 or so Russians.

About the middle of September, 25 of us were sent not too far from Hallie to work in a sugar beet factory. It was out in the country with nothing else around, except farm land. We worked in two shifts, twelve hours a day. On weekends we changed so that one week we worked days and the next week we would work nights. Of course, this was a seven-day operation. This was not the worse for we had a fair place to stay and a couple German women prepared the food. We were here until the middle of November and then went back to our camp.

Our job was to make the sugar into brown sugar, and then it was sent to Hallie to be refined into white sugar.

Then I was back in camp over Christmas time.

About the middle of January or so, 50 of us were sent to Chemonitz to work. It was winter time and cold, and snow was on the ground. The living was rougher now than it was before. What they had us doing here was digging up the middle of a street when a water line or sewer line was blown up. We would dig back far enough for the city workers to repair the line and then proceed back to the camp. of course, no transportation of any kind was made for us, so we walked back.

Our guards were older men, perhaps 70 or so. It was not easy for them either. As the Russians moved closer and closer, we were moved south and east, and perhaps were very close to Czechoslvakia when the war ended. We were in Russian territory, but within six or so hours, we were in "American hands.

Yes, I was a jeep driver for the 81 M.M. guns.

I hope this finds you all well and fine. We, Bernice and I, are not too bad. We seem to be busy all the time at something, and Bernice is still the associate pastor at the church.

Hello, Veteran KEY!

A few days ago I got a book "HISTORY of the 83rd IN-FANTRY DIVISION". I got it by a German historian and I'm looking for war memories. In this book I could read that you have been in Germany and was captured with three comrades in BADETZ near ELBE River. You were liberated by your own Division on May 5th. Do you remember these days in prisonship? I should like to know something about. What happened that you had to go in prisonship and so on! Do you still know the three other comrades? I was officer and fighting against the 83rd Div. in this part of Germany. I'm 72 years old. On Friday the 13th (April 1945) I went with a reconnaissance patrol in direction of FLOTZ - near BADETZ (about 10 km far) It was pm 17 hours and I crossed a field to get to this village FLOTZ. Suddenly we got fire out of a house outskirts of FLOTZ. We didn't know that the Americans had already crossed the ELBE River. We put down in the furrows, nobody was wounded. Here we're waiting for darkness for we couldn't move us before. Now we went in direction of this house and nobody could see us. Then I crept to the outside door and I heard voices - English spoken. I crashed the door open and cried "HANDS UP!" Four American GI's stood in front of me and took their hands up. Together we went in the cellar of this house and I asked for the situation in FLOTZ, because I was surprised about American Occupation.

My soldiers, or better some of my soldiers stayed outside of the house and had to look for movements. The Americans and I were talking over the war and spent the night in this cellar. One of my soldiers had to go to find the rest of my company, but he returned and couldn't find anybody in this darkness. So I lost the connection to my company and the battalion too. In the morning April 14th three of my soldiers were wounded and we didn't have anymore ammunition. Looking out of the window upstairs in the house I only saw American GI's and tanks. There were no voices of fights and I couldn't see any German soldiers.

What had happened? I was in a bad situation, but I had to decide. And there were these three wounded men. So I spoke to my American prisoners and said that one of them should call to his comrades of the other side of the street, because I couldn't continue the fight. One of them opened the house door but the comrades on the other side of the street were shooting to the opened door. Quickly he shut

the door. Fortunately he hasn't been wounded. Some minutes later he tried it once more and called not to shoot. He spoke to his officer and came back. Now I went in American prisonship. My memory to this hour is humiliating. I had a very bad treatment and was surprised above. The Americans I had in prisonship before, I didn't ask them for their own things anywhere. But I was taken aside and had to throw all my things on a manure heap. The belt, the cap, the cigarettes, my bag, a little piece of bread and so on. I had to empty my pockets and was lead to a corner of this farm. There I had to take my hands up and to look to the wall. I couldn't see what happened with my soldiers and the wounded men. I never saw somebody again!!! Still today I am asking for my men. Two days later an American took my watch and my ring. I had a terrible way in prisonship for the next ten weeks. "RHEINWIESENLAGER," St. Mere Eglise (in France), BOLBEC and LE HAVRE. But I was a robust man just 25 years old. From LE HAVRE I escaped in December 11th and reached my family in HAM-BURG the 29th. I heard that the veterans of the 83rd meet in September in Florida. I'll meet in September about five comrades near BADETZ! We couldn't meet us there before, because it was the other Germany. I don't know these five comrades but they took a trip to there as I did too for looking the graves of our killed comrades. Each of us went there during the last year and left behind his name by the mayor of the little village WALTERNIENBURG. BA-DETZ is 5 km

far. If one of the GI's is still alive who I took prison I should like to know.

Can you find out who was situated in FLOTZ? What a company? Perhaps I can get an address of somebody of this company. I don't know what happened to my soldiers and to the rest of my company. I should like to know too what happened with the wounded and killed German soldiers. And what happened with the killed GI's? I heard you brought them (the Americans) to the Netherland and Belgium. Around Badetz, Walternienburg, Forderstadt and so on (Elbe - Westside) there are many graves. Many graves with "unknown soldier". That's un intelligible to me. The Germans, killed on the eastside shall have been brought to the westside of Elbe river by the Americans. May that be? If you cannot answer my asks, perhaps you know somebody who can. Waiting for an answer - please not to long! I say kindly regards

I hope you can read and understand my English, for I didn't speak it since a many of years.

Tilly has visited the U.S. many times as guests of various units.

The above plaque is in recognition of the untiring efforts she has performed for those Thunderbolt men who have returned to visit Luxembourg.
