This guest column is dedicated to my father, Robert E. Derickson, your national secretarytreasure for the past 21 years. Bob past away on March 10, 2001. Dad's dedication to serve others was an inspiration to all that have known him. He believed in hard work and to never quit until the job was done. He continued to work on the behalf of your association through the end of January. Even when he was suffering with great pain from liver cancer he continued to do his best. His pride of serving the 83rd Inf. Div. WWII members was truly remarkable. He continued coaching me right up to the end on what had to be done to get this issue of the Thunderbolt published and sent out to all the members. It was only possible due to the great effort of his neighbor Mrs. Imogene Cornett, Mr. Jay Hartleb and Dennis Butterfield of J & D Printing, your President, Salvatore Scicolone and members of Executive Board. I wish to thank everyone for their help. I apologize to those chapters that were not contacted about dad's poor health.

The following is an excerpt from dad's Obituary: Robert E. Derickson, age 78, of Hamilton, Ohio, died at the McCullough-Hyde Memorial Hospital at 3:10 pm on March 10, 2001. He was born May 9, 1922, the son of Earl E. and Gertrude M. (Leugers) Derickson of Oxford, Ohio. He was educated in the Millville/Ross local school district, graduating from Ross High School in 1940. He married Pearl E. McDuffee on May 15, 1943 in Millville, Ohio. He farmed for three years prior to being drafted into the US Army during WWII. The date of entry was Oct. 10, 1942. He reported to Fort Thomas, Kentucky for induction and then to Camp Atterbury, Indiana for basic training. Robert was attached to the 3rd BN HQ 329th Rat. of the 83rd Inf. Div. the unit he remained with throughout the campaign. His unit was part of the initial invasion force in Normandy, France that commenced on June 6, 1944 through July 23, 1944. His unit saw action in five other major battles: Northern France July 24, 1944 Sept. 14, 1944; Luxembourg Sept. 15, 1944 -Dec. 31, 1944; Ardennes Jan. 1, 1945 - Jan. 31, 1945; Rhineland Mar. 1, 1945 - Mar. 31, 1945 and Central Germany where his 83rd Div. established the Bridgehead at the Elbe River for the final assault on Berlin April 1, 1945 - May 9, 1945 V - E Day. Germany's surrender was Bob's best birthday ever. The 329th Inf. Rgt. sustained 942 casualties of Officer and Enlisted men with several thousand wounded-in-action. He was awarded the Purple Heart from shrapnel wound during the Ardennes campaign Jan. 1945. His wound was dressed in the field hospital. He returned to action immediately. Robert was discharged from military service October 12, 1945.

After returning from WWII he worked in a paper mill and then returned to farming for six years. He became involved with 4-H as an advisor and the Butler County Fair Board while his children were growing up. The next 15 years he was a retail salesman, prior to working for Miami University of Ohio as a Food Service Manager for 25 years. He retired from Miami and began devoting his time to the 83rd Infantry Division. He served as their National Secretary/Treasurer for the past 21 years. Simultaneously, he also served on the Board of the Southwest Regional Water District. A life long member of Faith United Church of Christ of Millville. Ohio, he was a Tri-F member since the 1960's and held numerous positions in the church over the past 40 years, including a one time President of Counsel and current Treasurer of the Tri-F. Bob was also the recent Treasurer of the Millville-Ross School Alumni Association.

Robert and Pearl had two sons born prior and

during the war and four daughters born after he returned from the war. He is survived by his six children and their spouses - Edward E. and wife Kathryn A. Derickson of Oxford, Oh; Robert (Mike) and Judith A. Derickson of Hamilton, Oh; Barbara D. and Lancer R. Weinrich of Middletown, Oh; Frances N. and Michael M. Middaugh of Columbus, Oh; Marie A. and Timothy W. Lynch of Henderson, Ky. and Catherine J. and Bruce E. Darner of Hamilton, Oh. He has nine grandchildren, five great grandchildren, one brother and two sisters.

His wife of 58 years, Pearl, preceded him in death a year ago on March 4th, 2000.

Funeral services were held at the Faith United Church of Christ, 1877 Millville Avenue, at 10:00 a.m. Saturday, March 17, 2001 with Rev. George W. Hurter and Rev. Allen C. Minor, officiating. Burial was at the Greenwood Cemetery in Hamilton, Ohio. The Hamilton, Ohio DAV Military honor guard commemorated dad's service to his country, played taps and presented the American flag to the family as the Butler Country Sheriff's Bagpipe Corps played "Going Home" followed with "Amazing Grace", Chaplain Frank Hornack of 83rd Inf. Div. WWII Association gave honor for Dad's service to his country, the 83rd Inf. WWII Association, his life long service to his church and many organizations that he belonged was for the betterment of mankind. Chaplain Hornack's kind remarks were greatly appreciated. Norma Hornack read a beautiful poem during the funeral service.

My brother, four sisters and I feel blessed and graced with a father and mother that were so generous and kind to all they have known. We believe there were three things in dad's life that endeared him to be such a caring and humble man. Dad was raised on a farm during the depression. He learned the value of hard work at an early age. Dad found himself in the same situation that most young men of your generation when he was called to serve his country during a horrible conflict of WWII. Lastly, he felt fortunate to have served and returned home safely from war to raise a family of six children during a Cultural Revolution. This later experience may have been more humbling than the previous two experiences. He dedicated his life to his country, family, friends and God. We wish to extend our thanks to all who have been a buddy, friend and comrade of dad.

# Historian's Corner

We wish that everybody had a very Merry Christmas and a happy New Year. At this time, I would like to explain the reason I feel that the 83rd Infantry Division deserves another Battle Campaign Star making it 6 instead of 5. The Rhineland and Central European Campaigns were separated by the Rhine River. All Western Allies were told to halt at the Elbe River which was to be the Eastern boundary for Central Europe, but the 2nd Armored Division and the 83rd Infantry Division was ordered to establish a Bridgehead East of the Elbe River. For some strange reason, there were American made assault boats on the west bank of the Elbe at Barby. I realize that the 6th Campaign Star wouldn't buy a cup of coffee but the 83rd and other units need to have it documented for the record and History. If we fail to have the Eastern European Campaign documented, the future generations will not know the true final weeks of WW II and its ending. True, a few books acknowledge this fact and to others, it didn't happen but, we must see to it that all corrections are properly made.

The 83rds Bridgehead held due to the swift action of all involved. The Combat Engineers quickly put a bridge across the Elbe for tanks, artillery and support units to cross. The 2nd Armored's bridgehead did not hold for this reason. The Central European and Eastern European Sectors were divided by the Elbe River. I am enclosing a letter from Lieutenant Colonel Bernard P. Gabriel, U.S. Army, Chief, Military Awards Branch. He admits to the fact that the 83rd was indeed in the Eastern European Sector during World War II. He outlines the procedure to follow to receive the award. Now that the elections are over, it is time to approach a Congressman to pursue the glory the 83rd rightly deserves.

Sadly, the 83rd Infantry Divisions Public Relations Office was inactive from February to May, 1945 and therefore, missed out on all of the glory and Awards earned by the Veterans of the 83rd Infantry Division and Support Units. The information about the Public Relations office was obtained from the Files Richard Boyland gave me at the reunion in Catskill, New York and is greatly appreciated. There are quite a few interesting files listed and I will attempt to send for them.

Now for my intended trip to Germany for the German Veterans Reunion. Horst Reinhold is contacting the German Veterans that agree to being video taped regarding their experiences and at the exact location in their attempt to push the 83rd back across the Elbe River. Horst informed me that Peter Rettich agreed to allow the 83rd to use his War Diary in the intended movie. I asked Horst to submit his report regarding this. See you at the reunion at Hampton, VA, September 26 - 30, 2001.

And remember, we were indeed the Best of the Best. Best wishes and regards to all.

Thank you for your letter of July 22, 1999 to President Clinton concerning your desire to see members of the 83rd Infantry Division authorized a Battle Campaign Star for the Elbe Bridgehead battle in the Eastern European sector during World War II. Your letter was forwarded to this office, as the proponent for the Army's Awards and Decorations Program, for review and reply.

Unfortunately, the Elbe Bridgehead battle was not designated a campaign during or after World War II. During World War II, the senior Army commander in the theater of operations was authorized to grant campaign participation credit to units under his or her command. This authority was not further delegated. Although the 83rd Infantry Division did not receive campaign credit for the Elbe Bridgehead, they should be proud of their valiant combat record during World War II which included Battle campaign credit for Ardennes-Alsace, Central Europe, Normandy, Northern France, and Rhineland; Meritorious Unit Commendation (1 December 1944-31 January 1948): and occupation credit (Germany) (2 May 1945 - 27 December 1945).

In this regard, Title 10, United States Code, Section 1130, allows for referral of an award recommendation by a Member of Congress. The burden and costs for researching and assembling documentation to support award recommendations rest with the requester. Once received and upon review, a determination will be made as to the merit of approving the award or decoration, or any other determination necessary to comply with the provisions of the stature.

Completed award recommendations must be referred by a Congressional Member and forwarded to: Department of the Army, Military Awards Branch, 200 Stovall Street, Suite 7SO7, Alexandria, Virginia 22332-0471.

I trust the information I have provided will be helpful. Thank you for your interest in the Military Awards Program.







# Longtime English businessman, Homer Rickenbaugh, dies at 78

Homer Z. Rickenbaugh, owner and operator of several businesses, including English Hardware for almost 20 years, died at his home Monday, Jan. 8. He was 78.

Rickenbaugh and his wife, the former Ruth E. Wiseman, whom he married on May 2, 1942, opened their first business, a restaurant in English, in 1946.

Back then, the couple had been living in Evansville for a few weeks while Rickenbaugh, who had recently been discharged from the Army, worked at the Marine Hospital. Unhappy in the city and the barracks where they were living, they jumped at the opportunity when they heard the restaurant was for sale.

After they sold the restaurant, known as "Rick's Place" and "The Town Grill," they opened several other businesses in English, including a drug store, shoe shop, dry cleaners, two grocery stores and a "Drey" business, which involved delivering mail from the incoming trains to the Post Office.


In 1959 the couple opened English Hardware. They operated it for 19 years, before selling it in 1978. Although the couple sold the business, Rickenbaugh stayed active in different business ventures, until poor health caught up with him in the 1990s.

Rickenbaugh's wife and two daughters, Angela Thompson of Eckerty and Priseilla Roberson of Spiceland, Ind., said he was a quiet man. That is unless he was around the men he served with in World War II.

"We always said Daddy wasn't much of a talker, but you'd take him to those gatherings, and he opened up," Roberson said.

Rickenbaugh, who was drafted in October 1942, spent three years in the 83rd Infantry Division of the Army before being discharged on Nov. 3, 1945. He was a jeep driver, serving in the European Theater of operation, seeing battles and campaigns at Normandy, northern France, Rhineland, central Europe and Ardennes.

Throughout the years, he stayed close to those with whom he served. He was an active member of several veterans organizations, including English VFW Post 6160, Marengo American Legion Post 84, Kentucky Chapter 83rd Infantry Division World War II, Dixie Chapter

83rd Infantry Division and Crawford County Disabled American Veterans.

"The VFW was his first love," Ruth said.

The couple often attended the regional and national meetings of the 83rd Infantry Division, nicknamed the "Thunderbolt Division," even hosting a Kentucky Chapter event one year in Corydon.

"We had a really good time," Ruth said, remembering taking a train ride from Corydon to Crandall.

The Rickenbaughs also went to Camp Atterbury south of Indianapolis each year for a memorial service. Rickenbaugh trained there prior to going overseas during World War II.

Rickenbaugh also has another tie to the military base. He wrote a story about his time in the service that was published in the anthology "Atterbury Files" that dealt with the camp.

Rickenbaugh, whose unit landed on the beaches of Normandy just days after the D-Day invasion, received several honors, including an EAME Theater Ribbon with five bronze stars, Victory Medal, Bronze Star Medal, American Theater Ribbon and Good Conduct Ribbon.

The dedication he displayed in the Army was representative of his entire life, Ruth said. "There wasn't anything he couldn't or wouldn't do," she said.

"I don't think we could finish a meal," she said, joking that he would work all hours if somebody needed something done.

Born on June 25, 1922, in Celina, Ind., to the late Emory and Laura Mason Rickenbaugh, Rickenbaugh attended McWilliams and Taswell schools in western Crawford County before joining the U.S. Civilian Conservation Corps after the seventh grade. Stationed in Tell City, he helped plant pine trees.

Rickenbaugh also worked briefly as a truck driver and for Southern Railway, building bridges. The latter was a job that he did not enjoy too much, Ruth said.

After the war, Rickenbaugh also served his community by serving on the English Civic Club and Town Council for several years. He would get calls at all hours from residents wanting him to do things, from restoring electrical power to removing a cat from the yard, that he, as a council member, had no power to do. However, he didn't mind.

"He just loved his community and his country," Thompson said.

Later, he was active in the English Senior Citizens organization and attended Eckerty Christian Church.

Rickenbaugh's kindness and service was appreciated by the community. More than 300 people came to Denbo Funeral Home in English last week to say goodby to their friend and comfort his family.

Besides his wife and daughters, Rickenbaugh was survived by three grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

The funeral was last Wednesday, with burial in "Mathers cemetery in English. The Revs. Brian Martin and Bob Kelly officiated. Lois Blevins was the organist. Military rites were performed by English VFW Post 6160.

I am writing on behalf of the John Camp family: I am his granddaughter, Wendy (Camp) McLaughlin. I was looking through some of grandpa's things and wanted to report to you some news I thought others from Co. A 329th would appreciate knowing.

My grandfather, John H. Camp, I believe known to all of you as "the Ole' medic," died last Sunday morning, October 8th, at the Veteran's Administration in Danville, Illinois of complications of diabetes. Grandpa had put up a long hard battle with the disease but in the end, it won over his body. I wanted to tell you because I know how fervently he read the *Thunderbolt* and how much he thought of all of you. I've written up a note here that I would sincerely appreciate your including with your next submission to the *Thunderbolt*. It is a thank you from a generation of grandchildren who never really knew what the war was like until Grandpa began to get in touch with you all and tell us his stories.

Thank you so much to all the men and women who shared in his life. He loved you all very much and thought very highly of every person in Co. A. God Bless and thank you, again.

PS -- on a more personal note, I am compiling any information I can regarding Grandpa John's service in the European campaign. If anyone would have information about things he did, I would greatly appreciate hearing them. Grandpa frequently kept in touch with George Suchonelly and Grady Adair so I have their addresses and things. Thanks so much.

A certain generation goes by and there are things we don't know or can't understand. That's the way it is with WWII. Many of the men and women who fought so bravely for the sake of other's rights are no longer here to tell us of their feats. Many wouldn't anyway, as they are our grandfathers and great uncles, and neighbors. Our unsung heroes. But occasionally, they do tell us bits and pieces of life with toes so cold and black they know they'll lose them, or of sleeping in shallow muddy foxholes with a single blanket for two men scared and trying desperately to keep from freezing, or dying.

My grandfather, John H. Camp, served with Company A of the 329th Division of the 83rd Infantry Thunderbolt. He served as a medic and did not carry a gun, according to the rules of war. He told us few of these feats and struggles, not with pity, but as facts. Simply the way things were. So many of the comforts that we take for granted now were unspoken dreams to many of the boys, now old men, just praying to get home. There are still so many things my generation doesn't know. We get a glimpse by talking to our grandfathers and watching movies like Saving Private Ryan. But we will never really know the frigid cold nights and blood and mindset that comes with bringing peace. All we know and understand was that it was unthinkable, awful, amazing that it could be endured, incredible that anyone would be so noble to sacrifice their life for the freedom of someone else. It makes us ask ourselves, would we do that now should we be faced with it? Could we endure watching our neighbors lose toes, and whatever else? Are we equipped with that incredible honor and sense of duty that possessed those of you in my grandfather's generation? Would we be willing to give at all costs?

I don't know. But I would like to think so. The stories we were told, the places we've visited, the books we read, we know are only glimpses of what was done for us fifty some odd years ago in Europe and the Pacific. But from those of us who've heard even the tiniest bits, and specifically from all the family of John Camp, we want to say thank you. Thank you for what you did. Because of the bravery you all displayed, we are here today to acknowledge the fine men and women who served their country and their God so well.

God Bless you all and know we appreciate your efforts, not only for what you saved then, but for what you've created now.

### Co. "G" - 331st

Well we made it into the 21st century. In 1944 and 1945, I never believed that it would happen. We who lived through it are very fortunate, and I know that a lot of us believed that if we survived the war we would live forever. Hope each an every one of you many more years of good health.

I had a lot of holiday cards and wishes from "G" Company men. I am now in the process of reading the book "The Bloody Forest" all about the Huertgen Forest. It was one of the hardest battles fought during the war. Other divisions suffered many, many casualties, then turned it over to us to finally push through the forest to the Roer River. I believe that there were more Medal of Honor for that battle than any other one, including the storming of the beaches in Normandy.

On Nov. 3 and 4th, I had a wonderful experience. There in New York was a Germany Television crew making a documentary on the 83rd Division and Tony Vacarro. Tony is well known throughout Europe for his display of pictures in many countries. These are pictures that he took of the 2nd Bn. 331st and of the 331st Regiment during the war. The Television Co. provide air fare for me to New York. On Friday they filmed the area around New Rochelle and the Yacht Harbor which was a picture of the Marina in St. Malo. I was brought to New York, because I have in my possession the battle maps from the war.

On Saturday morning we went to the roof of Tony's apartment in Long Island City, to do the filming of the route of the 83rd in World War II. I spread the maps on a table and detailed what the 83rd had done in Normandy and in Brittany. They were interested in how we reached the Rhine River, and in detail of the route that the "Rag Tag Circus" took thru Germany. A lot of the filming was on the 83rd reaching the Elbe River at Barby and the crossing of the river. I was able to show the positions of the 329th and 331st in the first town across the river.

Then as we broke out of the bridgehead, and to final points of our advance to the town of Zebrst and how we had a chance to make history by being the first American troops to make contact with the Russians. We were never given that credit because at the Yalta Conference in February, the Americans were suppose to stop at the Elbe River. Under the leadership of Col. Crabill and Col. York we made the successful crossing (the only crossing). The 2nd Armored Division had crossed the day before (April 12) but they were pushed back across the river.

The documentary will be shown on Germany Television on May 2, 2001 Tony and I are suppose to get copies of the film. It is strange that on a tour of Europe with Steven Ambrosse, I related to him that we were the only Division to make a successful crossing of the river. I told him that when we did cross the river, the fighting was so intense that I had two options, one to go back across the river, or stay there and fight the Germans. His next question was "what was your decision, my answer to him was" "I couldn't swim."

in New Jersey well and we are looking forward to being with them in Hampton.



# Brig. Gen. Atterbury's custom rail car finds home on base.

A 1927 custom rail car built for then-Pennsylvania Railroad executive William Wallace Atterbury is scheduled to finish its journey this week to the military base that bears his name.

The battered, rusting hulk was scheduled to move from the Louisville & Indiana Railroad yard in Columbus today to Camp Atterbury, where it will become part of the base's museum -- the culmination of a three-year search for the antique car.

Camp Atterbury was named in Atterbury's honor when it was opened as an U.S. Army training site in 1942.

Atterbury was a vice-president of the Pennsylvania Railroad during World War I, when he was recruited by Gen. John "Black Jack" Pershing to organize the Allied transportation system in Europe.

Appointed a brigadier general, he returned to civilian life six months after the war and became president of the railroad in 1925.

The company's top executives all had private railcars, designed to allow them to conduct business while traveling, said Sgt. Cecelia Ellis, Camp Atterbury's public information officer.

Camp Atterbury officials first became aware of the rail cars through the 1994 book "The Railroad General: William Wallace Atterbury," by Patricia Davis.

Ellis began a search for the car, finally finding it last year as part of the collection of a Philadelphia businessman and train buff, Bennett Levin.

The collector owned three of the railroad's former cars, including one he had refurbished for his private use, Ellis said.

Levin agreed to donate the Atterbury car to Camp Atterbury. Norfolk and Southern Railroad

picked up the \$50,000 bill for loading and moving the antique car.

Col. Michael McGowen, Camp Atterbury's post commander, said the base will put the car behind the base's indoor museum, where it will eventually become an annex devoted to Atterbury.

McGowen hopes to have the car's rusted exterior repainted before the end of the year in the railroad's red and gold colors. Levin is also donating the original "Pennsylvania Railroad" lettering that adorned the car's exterior.


But it will take longer to restore the car's interior. Camp Atterbury officials have not had a chance to inspect the car's interior, but have heard from Levin that the car was nearly gutted.

In Davis' book, Atterbury's sons reminisced about the car, known as Car No. 180. According to their recollections, the car had a fireplace, two small and one large stateroom, a dining room, living quarters for a chef and steward, a galley and a pantry.

"There was no inlaid mahogany or the plushness of the Orient Express cars," George Atterbury said in the book. "Most of the furniture was made of steel. It was as wreck proof and fireproof as possible.

McGowen said the plan is to restore the car's parlor to its original state. But monetary limits will restrict how quickly the work can be completed.

The base can use federal funds to maintain the car once it is completed, but cannot use federal money to restore it. A fund-raising campaign will have to be used for the upgrades, McGowen said.

Henry Hauser - 83rd Div. 330th Reg. 2nd Bat. 1st aid man

It was some time around July 12th, 1944 when we were moving through the hedgerows of Normandy. The German artillery of 88's and mortars where coming in and casualties were heavy. We knew which direction the 88's where coming, either left or right or right & toward us.

When the whistle round of 88's came toward us we dove into ditches or hedgerows. Mortars coming were soundless and we never knew when they would explode around us. For this reason, we always stayed as close to the ground as possible. Around twilight all German artillery would stop and we would get in some rest. Every other soldier would be awake for one hour and then the other half would wake up and keep alert. As an aid man, I slept or rested until the call for "medic" was heard and then I would go to work - what ever was needed.

One evening, around July 12, 1944, we were dug in for the night when one of our soldiers peaked over our hedgerow and saw a white flag across the field, about a hundred yards south. The alert was sounded and every soldier along our section was up and their rifles toward the white flag as we watched about fifty German soldiers came out of the hedgerow, walking with their hands on their head, indicating that they were surrendering. Our rifle men slowly moved out and surrounded the Germans. We only had about sixty soldiers spread out along our hedgerow, so we had to be careful. As we moved around the Germans, one German prisoner noticed my red cross band around my left arm and wave me to him. I carefully walked toward him, and he blurted out in clear English, stating that he was an American and came from Detroit. I asked him what in the hell was he doing in the German army and he explained that he and his wife was visiting Germany and stayed too long, and eventually got thrown into the army. Then I asked him how this large group decided to surrender and he explained that they managed this because there were no SS officers around. I told him he had it made now and he would be headed toward the beach while we still were headed toward Germany.

When some of our rifle men escorted the Germans back and we were back in our fox holes we thought maybe the end of this horrible war was coming to an end. It didn't happen that way. I lasted until July 17, 1944, when we were on the outskirts of St. Lo. I was wounded and sent back to England. Around Nov. I was sent back into France and assigned to the 101st Air borne Div. I never returned to the 83rd Div. The war went on for nine more months.

If any members of the 83rd, 2nd Battalion remember this episode, please contact me.






Classroom WW II U.S. infantry weapons display.
