NEW ORLEANS, La.

On Aug. 1 at a special ceremony at the World War II Museum in New Orleans, La., Clifton Wooldridge of Alton and five of his fellow WWII veterans of the 83rd Infantry Division, United States Army, where knighted in "The Legion of Honor."

The French government's highest medal was awarded to these veterans because of their contribution to the liberation of France in WWII. Only a small number of Legion of Honor medals are awarded each year in the United States and much care is taken to recognize those with the most distinguished records.

Wooldridge's age prevented him from attending and his daugh-

A Report From Our Historian

How We Rediscover History

I received a phone call from Jerry McFarland a few weeks ago. He is a local historian in Lebanon, Tennessee who is trying to reunite some recently discovered dog tags that belonged to 83rd Division veterans. Jerry told me that the tags were an older design having five lines of information that included address and next-of-kin. The Army decided this would be too much information if the tags fell into the hands of the enemy, so new tags were issued with four lines of information, omitting address and next-of-kin.

The old tags were supposed to be destroyed, but it appears that these were just discarded by someone, and they were recently uncovered by a group that was searching for Civil-War items in the area where Jerry lives. They must have been thrown away while the 83rd was participating in the Tennessee Maneuvers.

Jerry would like to reunite the tags with family members of these veterans. so he has been cleaning the tags to allow him to read the information they contain. He has around 204 tags, and has sent me a list of names of some of them. He will continue to send names as he cleans the tags and puts the information in lists. Most of the vets appear to be from the north central states—Wisconsin, Minnesota, N. Dakota, Idaho, etc. It is starting to appear that these tags may all have been from the same company of the 331. I am starting to research this matter now.

I'm including a photo of some of the tags, as well as a list of names that Jerry has put together so far. If you recognize any names here, please contact me and I will put you in touch with Jerry McFarland. As Jerry sends along more names I'll post them on the 83rd Google group as well as upcoming Thunderbolts.

Lyn Magill-Hoch got the ball rolling by starting to research the names on Ancestry.com. We now have Tony DeMott, and Ross Fletcher doing name research as well. Lyn has already sent a number of emails to families and has positively located the family of Merlin Hollen. Tony is working on part of this list, and when I get a new batch of names from Jerry McFarland, I will split up the names into three groups (or more if I get additional offers of help). If anyone else would like to help find family members, please let me know so that efforts can be coordinated.



Editor's Note: According to the 99th Battalion's Official Website:

"The 99th infantry Battalion (Separate) was activated at Camp Ripley, Minnesota on July 19th 1942 as per written instructions by the War Department. This unique elite unit was to consist only of Norwegians and Americans with direct Norwegian descent. Soldiers picked out for this elite unit had to have a working knowledge of the Norwegian language and preferably already knowing how to ski."

The Very Latest from Dave!

I talked with Jerry McFarland this morning (November 17). He said he made the connection to the 83rd because three of the names that he researched were in NARA records as being with the 33Ist. He is still trying to figure out how they ended up with the 99th. The only thing I could think of is that they transferred to the 99th because they met the qualifications (Norwegian descent, could speak the language and ski). The 99th was activated after the 83rd, so I guess this would make sense.

I finally got the program of the Celebrations of the 70th birthday of the liberation of Bihain and its enclosed villages.

It will be at the museum site in Bihain on Jan 10th 2015.

Program of that day:

9:00 am — Departure of the march of the 83rd Infantry Division (Civilians and reenactors).

10:30 am — Welcome of the authorities by the representative of the ASBL (organisation of the 83rd in Bihain).

II:00 am — Arrival of the Soldiers of Liberty followed by a group of kids that represent the future Arrival of the Historical vehicles that did a tour in the surrounding villages (Ottré-Petit Langlir-...).

II:30 am — Inauguration of a monument "Unit Citation for the 83rd by General Patton on Nov 3th 1945" that will be unveiled by the Grandson of General Patton: George Patton Walters followed by the National Anthems and if the weather allows it fly by of Thunderbolts airplanes over the museum.

Laying of wreaths and flowers at the garden of souvernir in remembrance of Captain Leo Hurry and Bob Keck who were in Bihain a couple of years ago and who we dearly miss.

12:00 am - VIP drink at the museum.

Little lunch at the Chapiteau for the people who did the march and the reconstitution of "the battle of Bihain."

2:00 pm — inauguration of the new steel at the monument in Ottré (massacre of Ottré) It has been stolen last year + ending of the mars.

As I heard from Robert, there will be Belgian and probably also German television to capture the events on January 10th 2014. Some Belgian government officials, the mayor of Vielsalm together with the Embassador of the USA are also expected to be there.

We expect around 170-200 83rd dressed up reenactors and some 70 historical vehicles of all kind to be in Bihain that day.

We hope to see also some veterans and family of veterans so we can all join the remembrance of the hundreds of 83rd victims that fell in Bihain-Ottré-Petit Langlir and the other surrounding villages.

Dear John,





The Crosses of the Church of St. Pierre


A few months before the 70th anniversary, 8 crosses about two feet in height were found in a barn in Sainteny. When the crosses were wiped clean of dust and dirt Roman numerals were visible — at that moment those involved knew they must have come from the Church of St. Pierre.

More investigation revealed they were part of the original "Stations of the Cross" (also known as Way of the Cross); in French — Chemin de Croix or "Baraque Chapelle." The church had been badly damaged in the

fighting in July 1944 and the restoration was not completed until 20 years after the war. No one remembered that 8 of the 14 of the original crosses had been rescued from the church. They date from before WWI.

With the initiative of Jean-Paul Pitou and cooperation of the parish priest, it was agreed that returning the crosses to the church on the occasion of the 70th anniversary of the fighting and liberation would be a wonderful symbolic gesture of complete restoration. We funded a nominal amount for refinishing each cross and a ceremony was planned in which veterans and decendants would unveil the crosses for the congregation on the morning of anniversary celebrations in Sainteny, June 9.

We hung the crosses Sunday afternoon and covered them with paper in preparation for the monday event. The ceremony at the church and the unveiling were the first events of the anniversary celebration Monday, Jean-Paul and I worked on the text (below) of the presentation which I read in English and my son James read in French:



St.Pierre restored Cross

Early this year, the Veterans Association of the 83rd Infantry Division proposed a symbolic gift, the restoration of these eight crosses as a small contribution to preservation of the heritage of the people of Sainteny. Thus the combatants of the battle and their descendants are able to participate in its restoration. On this 70th anniversary the crosses return to their place in the church of St. Pierre. ▼

ARRTC Reflags, 83rd USARRTC Stands Up

In a reflagging ceremony held at Skidgel Hall on April 24th, 2014, the Army Reserve Readiness Training Center was redesignated the 83rd US Army Reserve Readiness Training Center.

Col. Ernest T. Parker, commander of the organization and Command Sgt Maj. Peter Brooks, conducted the ceremony by encasing the ARRTC colors and uncasing the new 83rd USARRTC colors. While the ARRTC's Minuteman logo will be retained, Soldiers assigned to the organization will now wear the black, triangular patch of the historic "Ohio Division."

Parker delivered the address because Maj. Gen. Lesniak, USARC Deputy Commanding General (Support), was unable to attend. In his speech, Parker summarized the histories of both organizations.

"This event signifies the merging of two US Army organizations and their separate histories into one," Parker said. "The ARRTC was stood up in peacetime to meet specific needs of the force. The 83rd Division was stood up twice in times of war to meet the needs of the nation. While the ARRTC's colors will be replaced by the 83rd's, this action in no way minimizes the ARRTC's significant contribution to the Army Reserve."

The organization's mission remains the same, to develop and execute relevant programs of instruction primarily for the Army Reserve, but also for other branches and components of the Department of Defense. Mainly in the areas of personnel administration, supply accountability mobilization and leadership, the 83rd USARRTC's training programs play a significant role in reserve units maintaining a high state of readiness

Auxais Memorial — 83rd Division

In 2009 our family purchased a house in Auxais, Normandy France, the house is in the American sector near to Sainteny. We live in England and try to spend as many days as possible each year in France as we love the people, the history and generally the French way of life. After researching the area we realised that the property and our surrounding land was the location of fierce fighting between the 83rd Infantry Division and the 17th SS Panzer Grenadiers during July 1944 which resulted in many casualties. The soldiers of the 331st IR 83rd Division were desperately trying to gain a foothold on the La Varde Peninsula the far side of the River Taute which is located across the marshland that lies at the bottom of our garden.

After spending many hours looking through original documents and studying aerial photographs from July 1944 we located a .30 calibre machine gun nest in the middle of our garden. So far we have unearthed over 3000 spent cartridges from a hole 2ft diameter and approximately 10 inches deep. We have found/purchased numerous 83rd related items in the 5 years we have been there including helmets, bayonets and even trousers/garments which were buried deep under a hedgerow. We have a small collection of 83rd items that have been found on the battlefield or acquired from private collectors from around the world.

During the month of July 1944 the 83rd Division lost many soldiers in and around our garden which got us thinking. Let's construct a Memorial to the brave soldiers of the 83rd in particular guys of 2nd Battalion 331st who manned the machine gun to which the bullets belonged. Up until this year Auxais didn't have a Memorial to the 83rd, so being the 70th Anniversary of the D-Day landings and our families growing obsession with the 83rd Division we thought it fitting to construct one on the battle site.


In 2013 we decided to commission a Memorial to be dedicated to the soldiers of the 83rd Division and to be constructed on the site of the mg nest. In all it took a year of planning, designing and ensuring the script was good in both French and English. The construction started in April 2014 and was finished by the middle of May. A huge thank you to 83rd Veteran Stan Bielen who came up with the wording. It was an honour for us to have him do this. He remembers the church in Auxais and the mg bullets whizzing over his head whilst down on the marais (marshland).


On 8th June this year on a hot and beautiful sunny day, the Mayor of Auxais unveiled our Memorial to the men of the 83rd Division with the help of several Veterans and family members. Over 100 people attended the event from many different countries around the world, with local farmers and villagers also attending. The day went wonderfully well with everybody having a great time, we hope to have another gathering again next June 2015 – any 83rd Association members would be more than welcome. Myself (83rd Historians apprentice) and Jean Paul Pitou (83rd Historian) are always willing to show you the area and try and pin point where particular companies were on certain days — if any veterans or their family members who read this article plan to travel over to Europe in the future let us know, we look forward to hearing from you.

To the 83rd Infantry Division Association,



Bernie Ray Jones of Bowling Green, Kentucky passed away on the 30th of April 2014, just twenty days shy of being 92 years old. He was born in Round Hill, Kentucky. He leaves behind his wife of over 68 years, the former Joyce E. Hays and two children (Norman L. Jones and Brenda S. Fitzpatrick). He had four grandsons and eleven great grandchildren.

He was a veteran of World War II, having served with the 83rd Infantry in Headquarters Company, 2nd Battalion, 331st Infantry as a corporal with an anti-tank squad. Bernie always shared his experiences and stories about being in World War II.

Bernie had his basic training at Camp Atterbury and was also at Camp Breckinridge after being on maneuvers in Tennessee, before going overseas. He told us that the 83rd landed on Omaha Beach around 10 days after D-day. When they moved off the beach they relieved the 101st Airborne. On July 4, the 83rd made their first attack. Sadly on that day, while under mortar attack the first man in his squad was killed. The company morning report said they were in Auvers, France.

Three days later on the 7th of July, Bernie was wounded (the first time) by shrapnel from a German 88. The company morning report said he was 5 miles SW of Carentan, France. He was hospitalized in England. When he recovered, he was assigned to the 104th Infantry along with a good friend from the 83rd named Jay Goodman. Jay and Bernie were disappointed that Eisenhower didn't keep his word to allow the

wounded to return to their original units. Both finished the war in Europe with the 104th Infantry. Bernie received a Purple Heart with a cluster with 3 bronze stars, showing he was wounded three times.

Bernie always told a story that happened while on maneuvers in Tennessee. This story involved a close friend of his, named Calvin Cobb from Birmingham, Alabama. It seems that Private Cobb was a real character and on this particular day he showed up for formation wearing only one "legging." An officer asked Private Cobb where his other "legging" was! Standing at attention he told the officer that the legging was—"lost in action, sir, lost in action!" Now remember, they were in Tennessee on maneuvers. This was one of our favorites to hear him tell, because it made him laugh every time he told the story.



He was very proud to have served his country as a soldier in the 83rd and the 104th Divisions. Bernie's heart was always with the men of the 83rd: that's why he attended so many of the 83rd reunions over the years, until his age and health would no longer allow him to travel.

Bernie was a wonderful man, whose life was shaped by his experiences. We will miss him very much, and we realize that there are many other families who have lost loved ones who were once a part of the 83rd Division. We will never forget how the men of the 83rd answered the call of their nation, and their willingness to give their best...and some gave all they had.

We agree with Tom Brokaw, that these men of the 83rd were truly a part of "THE GREATEST GENERATION"




Legacy Chapter News: Our Thunderbolt collection is going digital!

The Normandy 70th Anniversary Commemorations

One of the major events leading up to the D-Day commemorations was a dedication of a memorial to Col. Robert G. Cole, 101st Airborne as part of the annual commemoration, parade and banquet held in Carentan. Cole personally led his battalion to capture four remaining bridges on the road to Carentan, when his entire unit was pinned down for over an hour by intense fire from heavily fortified German positions. Ignoring the danger, Cole led a bayonet charge in clearing the defensive positions. As members of a division that relieved elements of the 101st near Carentan, Francis Markuns (Co. G 329th), Bill Spriggs (Co. C 329th), and Fred Pearson (453rd AAA AW)) were invited participants in the ceremony, accompanied by local school children.

During the annual commemoration of the liberation of Carentan that followed, a large number of veterans, including Fred Pearson, were awarded the Knight's Cross of the French Legion of Honor.

At moving June 6 ceremonies in Normandy, the 83rd was well represented among the more than 200 veterans who attended the commemoration at the American cemetery at Omaha beach. Bill Spriggs, Rudy Zamula, Fred Pearson, Francis Markuns and Tony Vaccaro were all in attendance.



President Hollande, distinguished guests, I'm honored to return here today to pay tribute to the men and women of a generation who defied every danger -- among them, our veterans of D-Day.

And, gentlemen, we are truly humbled by your presence here today.

Just last week, I received a letter from a French citizen. "Dear Mr. President, and the American people," he wrote, "[we are] honored to welcome you... to thank you again for all the pain and efforts of [the]

American people and others in our common struggle for freedom."

Today, we say the same to the people of France. Thank you, especially, for the generosity that you've shown the Americans who've come here over the generations -- to these beaches, and to this sacred place of rest for 9,387 Americans. At the end of the war, when our ships set off for America, filled with our fallen, tens of thousands of liberated Europeans turned out to say farewell, and they pledged to take care of the more than 60,000 Americans who would remain in cemeteries on this continent. In the words of one man, we will take care of the fallen "as if their tombs were our children's." And the people of France, you have kept your word like the true friends you are. We are forever grateful.

Here, we don't just commemorate victory, as proud of that victory as we are. We don't just honor sacrifice, as grateful as the world is. We come to remember why America and our allies gave so much for the survival of liberty at its moment of maximum peril. We come to tell the story of the men and women

who did it so that it remains seared into the memory of a future world.

We tell this story for the old soldiers who pull themselves a little straighter today to salute brothers who never made it home. We tell the story for the daughter who clutches a faded photo of her father, forever young; for the child who runs his fingers over colorful ribbons he knows signify something of great consequence, even if he doesn't yet fully understand why. We tell this story to bear what witness we can to what happened when the boys from America reached Omaha Beach.








Fort Alet — St. Malo, August 6, 2014



"On the evening of August 11, 1944, the 329th RI attacked Fort Alet to take it at night. The Germans let the attackers enter the courtyard of the Fort for slaughter. The survivors fell back on the morning of August 12. Then for five days, artillery, AT shot at the Fort. Several air missions took place. Finally, on August 17 the Germans surrendered the Fort.




