



My Congratulations to our new President John Hobbs and the rest of the Officers for the 1986-87 term. The Charleston Reunion will be their responsibility.


Once again, I urge all of you to send in your dues. Remember our goal is 2000 members.



My brother was killed-in-action on January 7, 1945 while serving with the 83rd Infantry Division. He was killed instantly by direct fire, while attacking an enemy fortified position at Malempre, Belgium, according to the telegram we received from the War Department. It might also have been when the 83rd Division was attacking the Germans at Langlier or Bihian, Belgium.

I found your name in the Veterans of Foreign Wars magazine. The magazine also noted that the 83rd Division was planning a reunion in August, this year.

Just as a possibility, I thought I might write you before the reunion and you might give me some additional information that we do not know. I believe my brother served in the 330th Infantry Regiment, Company D, 3rd Platoon. His name is:

William (Bill) Cartwright Celler

I myself served in the U.S. Navy and visited my brothers' grave in Honre Chapelle Cemetery in Belgium after my ship entered Antwerp right after the war ended.

Italian Director Visiting Atterbury POW Camp Site

Edinburgh, Ind. — Italian television director Massimo Sani stalked through head-high brush to find a certain boulder carved by Italian prisoners of war.

The boulder was reputed to be one of the few artifacts left from the time Camp Atterbury was a

prisoner-of-war camp during World War II.

Sani is researching and filming segments of a four-hour documentary, *II Ritorno di Prigionere*. (The Return of the Prisoners) to be shown on Italian television this fall.

The showing, which will depict the lives of Italian prisoners, coincides with the 40th anniversary of their return home from world-wide prison camps where they were held as captive enemy soldiers.

Approximately 3,000 Italian men were at the Johnson County military camp between April 1943

and May 1944.

Sani wanted to film the boulder, the site of the POW cemetery, the site of the compound where they lived, and a Catholic chapel that they built and decorated.

An ardent history buff, Sani became interested in the prisoners after completing a 1983 documentary on the Italian battles of World War II.

"We had 1.5 million prisoners spread all over the world. When they were taken prisoner, they were lost to their families, to the army they fought for and to the army that captured them."

He began the research for the film in 1984, and production began a year ago. He has visited Great Britain, France and Germany and will also visit camps in Hereford, Texas, and Huntington Beach, Calif.

A film crew from Indianapolis and an interpreter and liaison person from Radio Teleivision Italia, Anna Friedlander, accompanied Sani on his trip to Atterbury. They will be there Saturday filming the chapel and interviewing students who participated in the writing and production of the *Atterbury File* while attending Custer Baker Middle School in Franklin in 1983.

One of the co-editors of the Atterbury file, Don G. Wertz, is working with Sani while he is here. The research and documentation of events at Atterbury compiled by the 6th-through 8th-grade pupils of the school is one of the reasons Sani chose Atterbury as a film site. Wertz is a teacher at the school.

Sani, who was a Fulbright scholar at Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1955, is also interviewing area residents who remember the prisoners or have mementos from that time from the Atterbury prisoners who were allowed to leave the camp and work in nearby farm fields.

One of those farmers, Larry Dixon of Whiteland, remembered that the Italians had a "green thumb" for growing vegetables on his brother-in-law's truck farm, a talent not shared by the German prisoners who followed the Italians at the camp.

Some of the relationships developed during those war years transcended the hatred of the times; the family received letters and pictures after the prisoners were returned. Dixon said.

The Italian soldiers - some of whom were artisansleft behind gifts of boxes carved intricately in the form of books. The details were so exacting that the edges of the boxes appeared as individual pages.

After a day of discovering some of the ties that had bound Italy to Johnson County, Sani eventually discovered the boulder that he had only heard about.

It was in an abandoned corner outside the compound boundaries - an area accessible only with four-wheeldrive vehicles.

Written on the stone in English: "Atterbury Internment Camp. 1537th S.U. 12-15-42."

That could either be the date of their capture, or the Italian who wrote it might have gotten the date wrong, the finders speculated.



Our accommodations at the Hilton were superb. This was my first reunion I have ever attended and I thoroughly enjoyed it. I hope to attend next years again.


